 With another pleasing display of hockey, Georgetown's Juvenile OMHA entry "Brill's Braves" went all-out to overcome a strong Milton aggregation by 4-3, on Monday night at the local rink, putting Milton, in the cellar, and tying Georgetown and Acton for first place.
 Brill's Braves must be commended for the way they defended themselves and won the game from the fighting Milton crew.
 The first period was the best of the game, when the Bruins' Braves turned on the pressure and outplayed their opponents to take a 3-1 lead. The first goal after two minutes of play came from "Hard-Shot" Haines on assist from Schenk. Ten minutes later after a strenuous gangling attack Ingles flashed the red light on a pass from Norton to make it 2-0. Milton then put on the pressure and from a scramble put the visitors one goal down on a goal to Vaughn. The final score of the period went to "Pep-Wee" Huffman, receiving a pass from Ingles, to tally a beautiful shot from inside the blue-line.
 The second period started off slower, but gained momentum, as the valiant Braves let Milton carry most of the play and some excellent back-checking and outstanding goal-tending kept the Miltonites at bay.
