## Norval and Union Presbyterian Churches Have Good Year

The greatest financial contributions in history, \$1209 and \$340 for missions were reported by Jack McDonald and George H. Leslie at the Union meeting, which was the 115th annual gathering. Plans were made to beautify the church grounds and to construct a circular driveway at the front of the church this year. ## MILTON SHORT COURSES CONTINUE TO CREATE KEEN INTEREST

The Short Courses in Agriculture and Home Economics being held in Milton are now in their final week. The attendance on the whole has been most satisfactory, states Agric. Representative J. E. Whitelock. Some of the highlights at the young men's class during the past week were as follows: two afternoons on Farm Machinery in J. W. Higgins' farm implement shop, where H. Coggins of the I.H.C., Hamilton, demonstrated on Mowers and Binder-Knotters. On the latter subject Harry Dear of the Massey-Harris Company also cooperated. One afternoon was spent at the Valley Crest Farm, where classes on *Climatic Control and Guernsey cattle* were judged. Then Dr. Henderson, of the Ontario Veterinary College, Guelph, spent a morning with the boys on Animal Diseases, and Prof. J. Francis, of the Poultry Department, OAC, gave the young men some sound, practical pointers on Poultry, on Friday morning. The day spent at Canada Packers will long be remembered by all members of the group. An excellent programme had been arranged and aside from an interesting tour through the many parts of the plant while in operation, they were able to inspect on the rail, carcasses from hogs which they had previously criticized on foot. Perhaps the outstanding feature of the day's programme was a cutting demonstration, in which one side of an 'A' hog and one side of a 'C' hog were cut up into domestic cuts and their relative wholesale value calculated.

Friday afternoon brought their weekly literary, where in addition to numbers by the students themselves, Mr. Geo. E. Elliott, well-known lawyer of Milton, followed up his initial discourse of two weeks ago, on 'Father & Son agreements' by leading an excellent discussion on 'Deeds and Mortgages.'
