With half a minute to go in the second period, Schenk carried the puck through the Acton team, and laid a perfect pass to Hamilton, who made no mistake in finding the corner for his third point of the night.

Starting the third period, Schenk flared the light to put the Braves two up. Shortly after, the Braves on a ganging attack slid the disc past Guild to apparently sew up the game, but referee "Junior" Beaumont claimed the puck was received in the ruse, and so the score was not allowed. This seemed to spark the Juvenile Tamers and they finally tied the game on goals by Mowatt and Townsley.

In the overtime Acton made certain of first place by scoring twice on goals by those same two dippy-doodlers, only for a little variation Townsley scored first with the last tally going to Mowatt.

It was a hard fought game, but very cleanly played, with little to choose between the teams, as both sides gave their all.
