Halton Community Centre Is Taking Shape

The Halton Community Center situated along the Twelve Mile Creek at Lowville will be taking shape as early in the spring as the weather will permit. The Committee appointed by Halton Federation of Agriculture at the last directors' meeting, met recently on the grounds, made a complete survey, then adjourned to R. Heatherington's home to plan the 1948 development program.

Last fall several buses were held to clear the park grounds with farmers from all over the county pitching in to get 75 per cent of this work done. In the spring, the committee will take advantage of the offers of municipalities and of private individuals to send in road machinery to level and grade the grounds.

In the next few years the committee visualizes such improvements as picnic tables and benches, pavilions with kitchen, wash rooms, running water, a foot bridge over the creek, hydro, illuminated ball diamonds, a community hall and all other facilities to provide accommodation for all types of recreation. This will all proceed as money becomes available and a financial committee has been appointed for raising a sufficient sum for 1948 developments. If \$2500 could be raised this spring, it is felt the grounds could be put in shape in time to make the community centre a fact this summer.

The committee's work has only commenced and the members were gratified to hear so many citizens in the county expressing their approval of the project undertaken by the Federation of Agriculture to provide a Halton community centre. Other counties are adopting the idea and it is with some pride that Halton people realize that the county is leading the way in such a worthwhile endeavour.

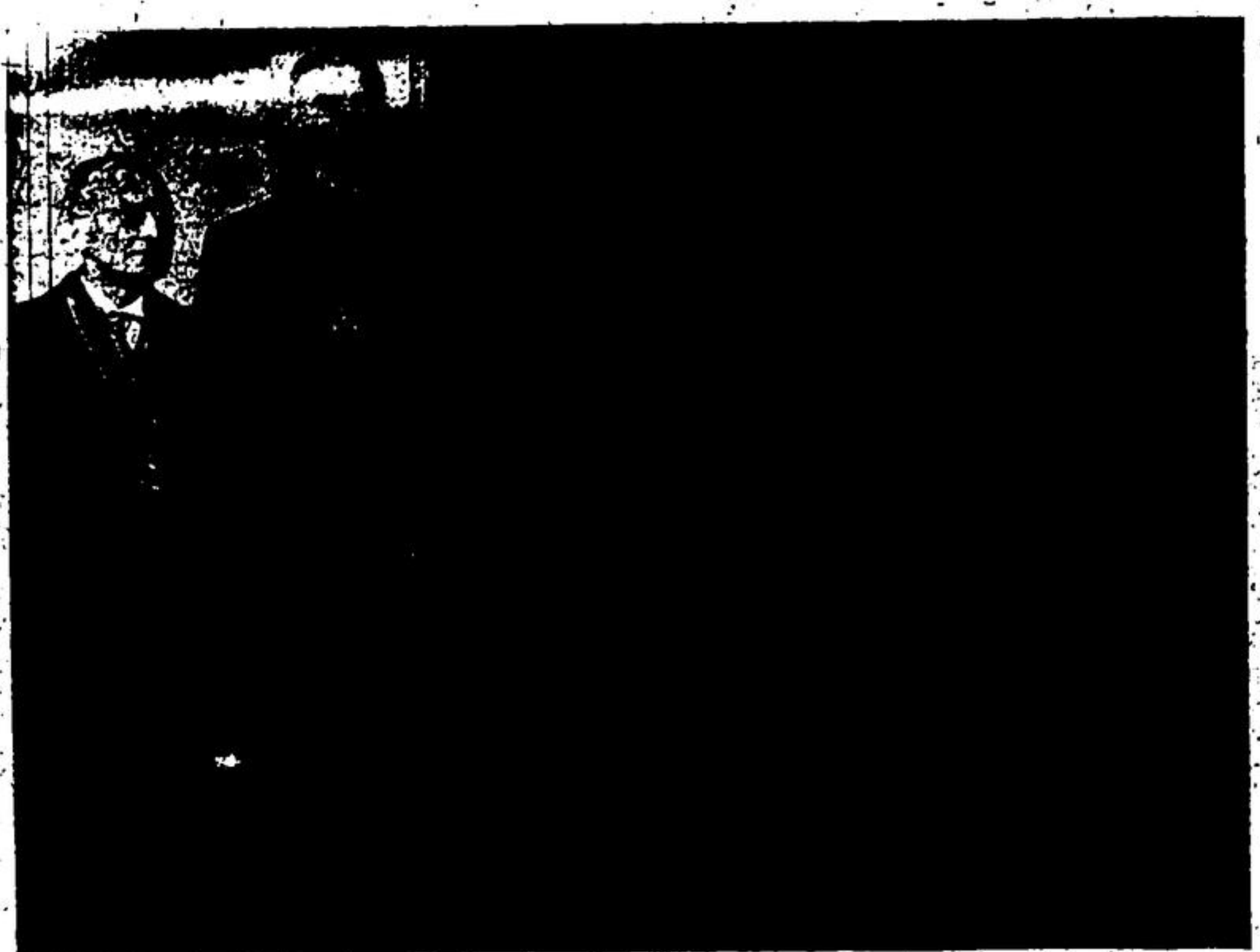
