## "Nicky" Ferri Stars as Georgetown Trims Brantford 5-3

**SATURDAY NIGHT EXHIBITION  
FIXTURE PROVED POPULAR AS  
1200 ATTEND GAME**

It was hockey night in Georgetown last Saturday, when the local hockey fans saw over 1200 cheering hockey fans on hand for an exhibition fixture between Brantford Redmen (last year's Intermediate A champions) and the Georgetown Papermakers. No doubt a series of these Saturday night affairs would be popular with the fans.

The Brantford team have been playing Senior hockey this season, so that the 8-5 win by the Papermakers was well merited and shows the calibre of the local pucksters. It is true Brantford was somewhat handicapped by being able to dress only ten men — but what they lacked in numbers was certainly offset by the fine playing of the team, although it was an exhibition feature.

"Nicky" Ferri won for himself the first star of the game for his fighting spirit all the way and gathering two goals and an assist in the night's play. Rhodes probably deserved the second star for stopping nice shots rifled at him from the Brantford sharpshooters. Third star goes to Jack Birtwistle who stopped the Brantford speedsters with some nice defensive tactics.

Hann, Kenney and the Redmen's goalie come in for the visitor's three star selection.

If local housewives will cooperate in saving power wherever possible, power shut-downs in Georgetown may be unnecessary. A temporary emergency arising from sub-normal rainfall in Quebec last autumn has resulted in a serious power shortage in southern Ontario. In Toronto compulsory shut-downs have been in effect at certain hours of the day for over a week and unless full cooperation is received, the shut-downs may spread to the smaller suburban centres.

In Georgetown, industries have given full cooperation in the emergency. Some plants have achieved a ten per cent reduction in power used by shortening daily working hours, while others are following a policy of checking on waste and eliminating certain processes not immediately essential to keep production going. Merchants, too, have been asked to curtail interior store lighting wherever possible. Graham Farnell, chairman of Georgetown Hydro Commission, states that there is some chance that with full cooperation here, no shut-down will be necessary, but that if it must come the Ontario Hydro Commission has promised to do its best to give advance warning.
