### Former Peel County Sheriff Dies

Dr. Frederick S. Hutchinson, V.S., formerly sheriff of Peel County, died at his home in Brampton last Wednesday. In failing health for three years, he had been compelled to retire from the many organizations with which he had been associated.

Born on lot 2, 3rd line west Chinguacousy, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Hutchinson, he was in his 62nd year. After graduating from the Ontario Veterinary College, he practiced in Cheltenham and then moved to Leamington where he worked for the government for a short time. He returned to Brampton where in 1919 he married Ruth Hull.

Dr. Hutchinson was known throughout Ontario as a showman and a judge of trotting and show horses. He had been president of the Ontario Standard Bred Horse Association, was a past president of Brampton Fair and of the Brampton Lions Club. In 1934 he was president of Peel County Liberal Association and the following year became sheriff, holding the position until his retirement two years ago. He was a member of Brampton Baptist Church.

Surviving are his widow and five daughters, Mr. Charles Wilkinson, Brampton, Mrs. Richard Murray, Winnipeg, Miss Hattie, Toronto, Mrs. J. R. Funston and Ruth, both of Brampton.

### Lloyd Pickard Second In Judging Competition

Lloyd Pickard, Oakville, was second amongst the 1,300 competitors from all parts of the continent who took part in the Open Judging Competition held in connection with the selection of All-Canadian Holstein cattle. Mr. Pickard had a score of 146 points as compared to 148 out of 150 for the winner J. J. Murphy, Huntingdon, Quebec. J. C. Alexander, Georgetown, was in 32nd place with a score of 136 points closely followed by Johnston Neelands, Hornby, with 134 points.

In the Junior section in which entries were received from 505 Calf Club boys and girls throughout the Dominion, Stewart S. Alexander, Georgetown, was tied for 12th place with his score of 134 points. He was closely followed by Douglas C. Alexander, Georgetown, who was tied for 17th place with a score of 132 points.

The winner of the Junior Judging Competition was J. Earl Brown, 15-year-old Newcastle, Ontario, boy with a score of 144 points. Tied for second were Clare G. Hartley, Woodstock, and Marjorie Snyder, Waterloo, with 138 points each. It is interesting to note that no less than 22 different Calf Clubs are represented amongst the top 34 contestants that scored at least 130 points, this indicating the wide distribution of the prizes.

In the open competition J. J. Murphy, Huntingdon, Quebec, was first with a score of 148 while Lloyd A. Pickard, Oakville, was second with 146.
