Norval Juniors will meet Acton in a 2-game series for the Halton Junior Farmer hockey championship. Playing in Milton Arena Monday night they defeated Palerno 6-4 in 20 minutes overtime in a sudden death game to win the right to meet the league leading Acton team.

Palerno came back strongly in the second with D. Galbraith and Bridgman scoring and Gord Fricker beating Nixon on a beautiful shot for Norval to make it 4-3. Galbraith tied it up in the third.

Ten minutes overtime failed to produce a score but in the second overtime period Lyons scored at the 2-minute mark and Fricker added another a few minutes later to make the final score 6-4.

ON MONDAY, MARCH 1st

A letter from Mr. Loggie, division engineer, Canadian National Railway, sent plans covering the proposed replacement of masonry abutments over the 6th Line on lot 21, and asked that blueprints be signed and embossed with the township seal.

Agricultural Representative J. E. Whitlock asked the township to pay a portion of rent for courses in Agriculture and Home Economics held in Milton in January. Six boys and nine girls from Esquesing were enrolled. \$22.16 was voted for this purpose.

A letter was received from Hutton, Presbytery of the United Church regarding the decision of County Council last December in adding its voice to the movement to legalize sweepstakes in Canada and urging Hutton Council to reconsider the question.

A \$10,000 bond on treasurer K. C. Lindsay was placed with General Accident Assurance Co. through George C. Brown, agent at a yearly \$40 premium. Workmen's Compensation insurance was placed with the same company.
