Celebrates Eighty Second Birthday in Florida

Members of the Guthrie family, former residents of town gathered at the Manhattan Hotel in St. Petersburg, Florida, on Saturday, February 28, to celebrate the 82nd birthday of Mr. Edward J. Guthrie. He is the eldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Guthrie and was born in Erin. At the party were his brothers, Nathaniel, 79 and George, 77. The three men, with their wives are spending the winter months in Florida.

Although the Guthrie family left Georgetown many years ago, they have kept in touch here, and Nat and George regularly attend the Fall Fair here, where Nat contributes the prizes for the baby show each year. Edward is a retired railwayman, starting his career on October 1st, 1889, with the Grand Trunk as a switchman. He was later a telegraph operator and for nine years an agent at various places. In 1907 he entered the service of the Central Vermont Railroad as general agent at St. Alban's, Vermont. Later he was general agent at New London, Conn. and at Pier 29, East River, New York, and was promoted to superintendent of the Southern Division. He last held the position of superintendent of the Central Vermont Transportation Company in charge of steamers operating between New London and New York. In 1932, he retired after 46 years service.

His brothers are both veterans of service with the Toronto Police Department, Nat serving over 50 years and George 46 years, before their retirement a few years ago.

Edward, or "E. J." as he is known by his friends, has three children, James of Pittsburgh, Pa., John of Springfield, Mass. and Mrs. George Andrews (Jessie) of Toronto. He has two sisters, Mrs. Rebecca Strong of Newcastle, Pa. and Mrs. Isabella Beazley of Neville, Saskatchewan. Two brothers, Bob and Dave are deceased.

The brother never tire of talking of their young days in Georgetown, where they attended school and were members of the Presbyterian Church. They treasure a number of badges and medals won in running, jumping and lacrosse. It is an interesting fact that Ed and George were printer's devils at the Herald many years ago.

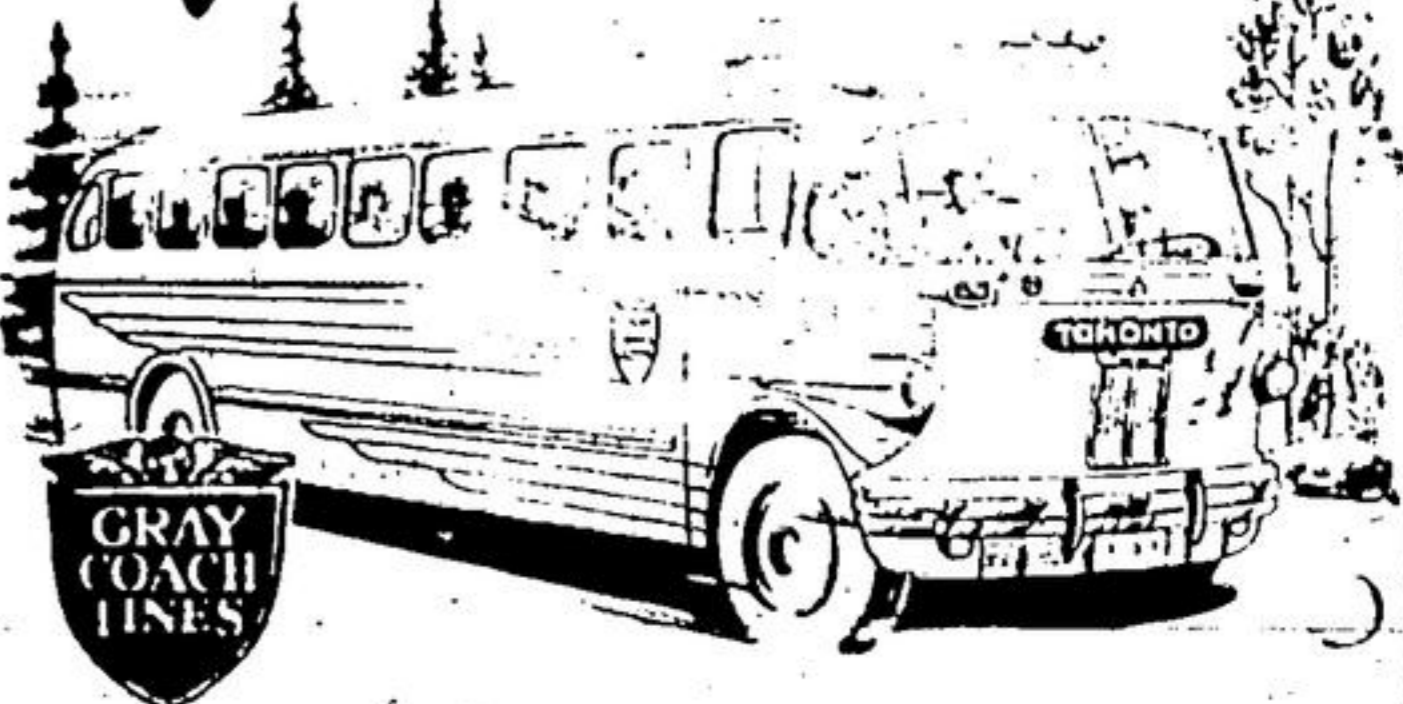
