DIAL TELEPHONES FOR GEORGETOWN IN 1950

In conversation with Mr. W. O. Misener, Manager of the Bell Telephone Company for this district, he advises that plans of the Company contemplate changing the magneto telephone system and service to the dial or automatic type, at Georgetown, either in 1950 or early in 1951. This is part of the Company's construction and rehabilitation programme to convert all magneto exchanges to either manual common battery or dial operation as fast as equipment and manpower can be made available during the next few years.

Despite heavy demands on the Company's facilities, resulting in an increase of 129,061 telephones during the year 1947, there were still 94,000 applicants waiting for service in the Company's territory at the end of the year. Georgetown has been particularly fortunate in the respect that it has been possible to provide for an increase of 465 telephones during the war and post-war years. Notwithstanding this heavy growth, only 33 applicants are at present deferred here; the majority of which will be installed during the next few weeks, upon completion of a switchboard extension which is now under way.

Mr. Misener reiterated that plans outlined for service modernization of Georgetown are an integral part of the Company-wide plan to meet the public demand for more and more service, always with a view to improvement in its quality.

371 Case of Measles in This County This Year

(Prepared by Halton County Health Unit.)

The large cities near Halton County have in the past few months experienced widespread outbreaks of measles. It was hardly to be expected that the residents of Halton County would escape an epidemic of this disease. All persons are susceptible to this disease and one attack usually gives immunity for life. Probably 80 to 90 per cent of persons by the age of 20 years have had an attack and rarely does a person go through life without having had measles. It occurs most commonly between 5 and 14 years of age but many cases are in children under 5. Measles tend to spread in periodic epidemics every 3 to 5 years.

In Halton County from the beginning of December to the end of February, 371 cases of measles have been reported to the Halton County Health Unit. This probably does not represent all the cases since often a doctor may not have been called in during the illness. The table below will show the distribution of this disease in the various parts of Halton County during the past three months.

The question is often asked, why are cases of measles not placarded and quarantined in the same manner as diphtheria, whooping cough, scarlet fever, etc. It has been found by experience in all the Provinces in Canada and the States in the United States that placarding of cases and quarantine of contacts did

nothing to control the disease. Further, the Provincial Department of Health some years ago passed legislation to the effect that a case of measles is to be kept home for 7 days from the appearance of the rash but there would be no quarantine of contacts or placarding of houses where cases occurred.

The fact that houses are no longer placarded and contacts no longer quarantined does not mean that measles should be regarded as a trivial illness. Measles can be a very serious illness, particularly in the young child and measles are likely to develop complications such as pneumonia or ear infection. Therefore, when a child develops measles, the parent should not send the child back to school at the end of 7 days just because the legal requirements have been fulfilled. Rather, the parent should be quite sure the child is well enough to return to school and, if in doubt, consult the family physician in this regard.

Parents should be on the outlook for the early signs of measles as at the present time when an epidemic is in progress. Measles should be suspected if a child develops fever and has the appearance of a cold. If the child has not had measles and has these symptoms the child should be kept home from school until such time as the parents are sure the child will not develop measles.

It is felt that an epidemic has passed its peak in certain parts of the country, as around Georgetown district, but it is probable there will be many more cases in areas of the county where few children have as yet developed the disease.
