STORES WILL CLOSE EARLY BEFORE HOLIDAY

At the monthly meeting of the Retail Division of the Board of Trade held last Friday in the Municipal Building, merchants decided to close at 6.30 p.m. on Thursday, March 25th, before the Good Friday holiday, rather than remain open till ten o'clock as has formerly been the custom. Stores will be open on the Thursday afternoon as is usual when there is a holiday on Friday.

In answer to a request from the Local Council of Women, the meeting featured a fund-raising drive for collecting money for the Canadian Appeal for Children and full cooperation was promised by the ladies.

The question of waste disposal containers on Main Street was discussed and enquiries are to be made as to what is available. Graham Furnell, chairman of the Hygiene Commission, asked merchants to continue to cooperate in saving power by restricting lighting wherever possible.

President Clarence Bain, Walter Biehn and Graham Furnell were appointed a committee to draw up suggestions for a constitution to be presented for discussion at the next meeting.
