BRAMPTON FLOOD WORST IN HISTORY

Reports of the Flood in Brampton yesterday are that Main Street merchants were seriously hit. The flood came up so fast that even cars were "stranded" on the street and there was up to five feet of water from the CNR railway bridge as far down as the four corners. A jewelry store was almost completely washed out, with windows broken by ice and merchandise scattered in the street. The new theatre, scheduled to open next Monday was extensively damaged. Gray Couch buses were re-routed around the town and many Georgetowners who ordinarily travel from Toronto by bus had to use the train.
