**MARCH MEETING OF

Reports and correspondence were read by the secretary and Treasurer and a discussion was held on the progress being made along educational lines.

A delightful tea was served and Mrs. H. E. Butkin moved a vote of thanks to Mrs. Beaumont and her co-hostesses, Mrs. P. P. Benner and Mrs. Ray Thompson for their hospitality.

The next meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. J. A. Early, Georgetown, on May 20th.

CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Children's Aid Society was held in the Society Office, Milton, on the evening of March 9th, with the President, Mrs. M. E. Nixon, in the chair. Accounts for the month of February amounting to \$676.72 were passed for payment.

The Superintendent reported having attended a Placement Institute at the School of Social Work in Toronto during the month of February, interviewing a number of prospective social workers who will be graduating in the late summer.

By resolution the Board adopted The Retirement Annuity Plan for employees of the Society.

As the Society are presently without a Reception Home for children coming into care, it was decided to again advertise in the local county papers for a suitable home since the need is most urgent.

Since the last news item, a number of cash donations and splendid parcels of clothing as well as a layette have been received in the office and are gratefully acknowledged.

Plans for the annual meeting were discussed and the President, Mrs. M. E. Nixon, Mr. William Deane and the Superintendent were a committee appointed to make the necessary arrangements.

The monthly report for February showed 57 Child Protection cases open, 93 children in care, 3 legal adoptions completed and 3 new unmarried parent cases reported during the month. The Superintendent reported a steady demand for infants suitable for adoption, but great difficulty in obtaining suitable foster homes for older children.

**CANADIAN HOLSTEIN
WORLD CHAMPION**

Official figures just released by the Record of Performance Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture credit Lonelm Texal Happy a purebred Holstein owned by R. M. Berry, Wilton Grove, Ontario and bred by George C. Jackson, Downsview, Ontario, with her third consecutive yearly record each above 30,000 lbs. of milk on three times a day milking. "Happy" thus becomes the official World Champion for milk production for three consecutive lactations on three times-a-day milking with her total of 91,891 lbs. milk containing 3357 lbs. fat. She has a great string of records that give her championships in many classes. She is the Canadian champion for milk production for two consecutive lactations on three times-a-day milking and is second in Canada for milk production for both four and five consecutive lactations on three times-a-day milking. In addition, she is the Canadian champion Holstein for butterfat production for two three, and four lactations on three times-a-day milking and is second for butterfat for five lactations on three times-a-day milking. Her latest record of 30,279 lbs. milk containing 1189 lbs. fat, average test 3.88 per cent was made as an eight-year-old and is the fifth largest for butterfat ever completed in Canada in the mature class of the yearly division on three times-a-day milking. In her previous two lactation she gave 30711 lbs. milk containing 1101 lbs. fat, and 30710 lbs. containing 1086 lbs. fat. She is the only Holstein cow in Canada ever to complete four consecutive lactations on three times-a-day milking with an average of over 1,000 lbs. of butterfat. (Her actual average is 1017 lbs. butterfat).

"Happy" was milked during her latest lactation by William Cliff, Herdsman for R. M. Berry. She was hand milked throughout. Mr. Berry is a London businessman, president of the London Pure Milk Company who gets his relaxation through his farm.

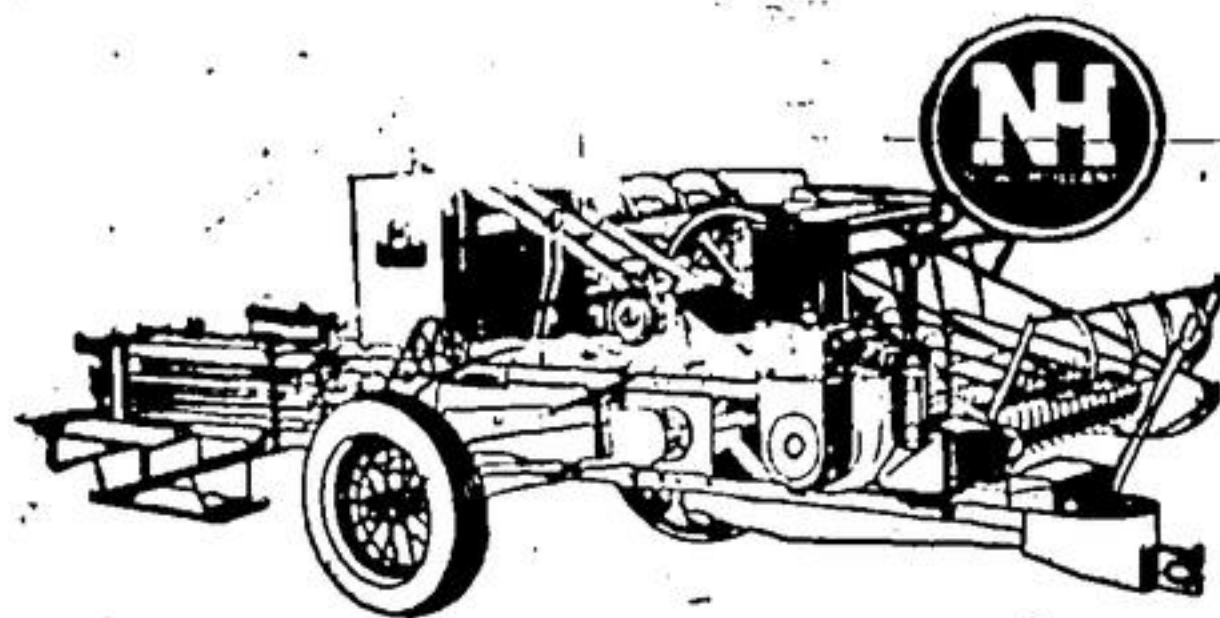
