## Georgetown Raiders Two Games Up on Markham

### Georgetown Win Three Out of Four Games in Best of Seven Series

#### Fifth Game to be Played in Oshawa Tomorrow Night — Another Special Team.

Probably the highlight in hockey for Markham Millionaires and Georgetown Raiders may or may not be concluded tomorrow night when the teams meet for the fifth game of the series. Should the Raiders win the contest, the series will be over and they will have the Int. "A" Championship. If Markham is the winner, the sixth game will be played here on Saturday night.

This has been a good series so far with some exceptional hockey being played. The team that eventually carries the Intermediate "A" banner should have no qualms about entering into further competitions, and will be a worthy Ontario entry in the Eastern Canada finals.

The scores on the series so far are as follows: Georgetown 4, Markham 1; Markham 4, Georgetown 0; Georgetown 1, Markham 0; and Georgetown 5, Markham 4. On the round so far Georgetown is one goal up on the total goals scored, and three games up on the series. Both goalies have had shut-outs.

Three games have been played since the last paper was published. Last Thursday night the Millionaires visited Georgetown and outsmarted the home team 4-0 in the second series game. This was rather a disappointment for the 1700 fans present, as the Markham team certainly deserved the win on the type of hockey exhibited. However, the Raiders regained their former stride, and on Saturday night skated out a 1-0 win at the Oshawa arena, and back home on Monday night edged the Millionaires again to the tune of 5-4 before 1900 cheering fans.

#### THURSDAY'S GAME

Markham reversed the score on Georgetown Raiders last Thursday when they out-scored the locals 4-0 in the second game of the series. They played an outstanding brand of hockey that caught the Raiders in a slump that they couldn't get out of during the entire affair. #### MONDAY'S GAME

Probably the highlight in hockey fixtures from a Georgetown standpoint was the affair here on Monday night when Markham was beaten 5-4. The winning of this game put the Georgetown team in the driver's seat and left them in a very coveted position in the series with only one game to be won out of the next three for the championship.

The locals started early to pile up a score and in the first period scored three goals and left the visitors scoreless. Markham all but evened the score in the middle session, Lawrie and Watson combining to bulge the twine on two occasions.

The third stanza proved to be a hectic affair and as the ice softened, tempers hardened and the game became quite rough. Seven penalties were handed out, with Perry of Markham drawing a misconduct penalty after a fracas with Gibson in the corner. During one of the tangles at the lower end of the arena, part of the boards gave way at the centre and the crowd which lined this sector found themselves lying out on the ice. Meanwhile a feud started in the stands and one young man was escorted out by the police.

Markham tried hard to tie the score in the dying moments of the period, and did manage to come close as they scored their fourth goal at the 18-minute mark.

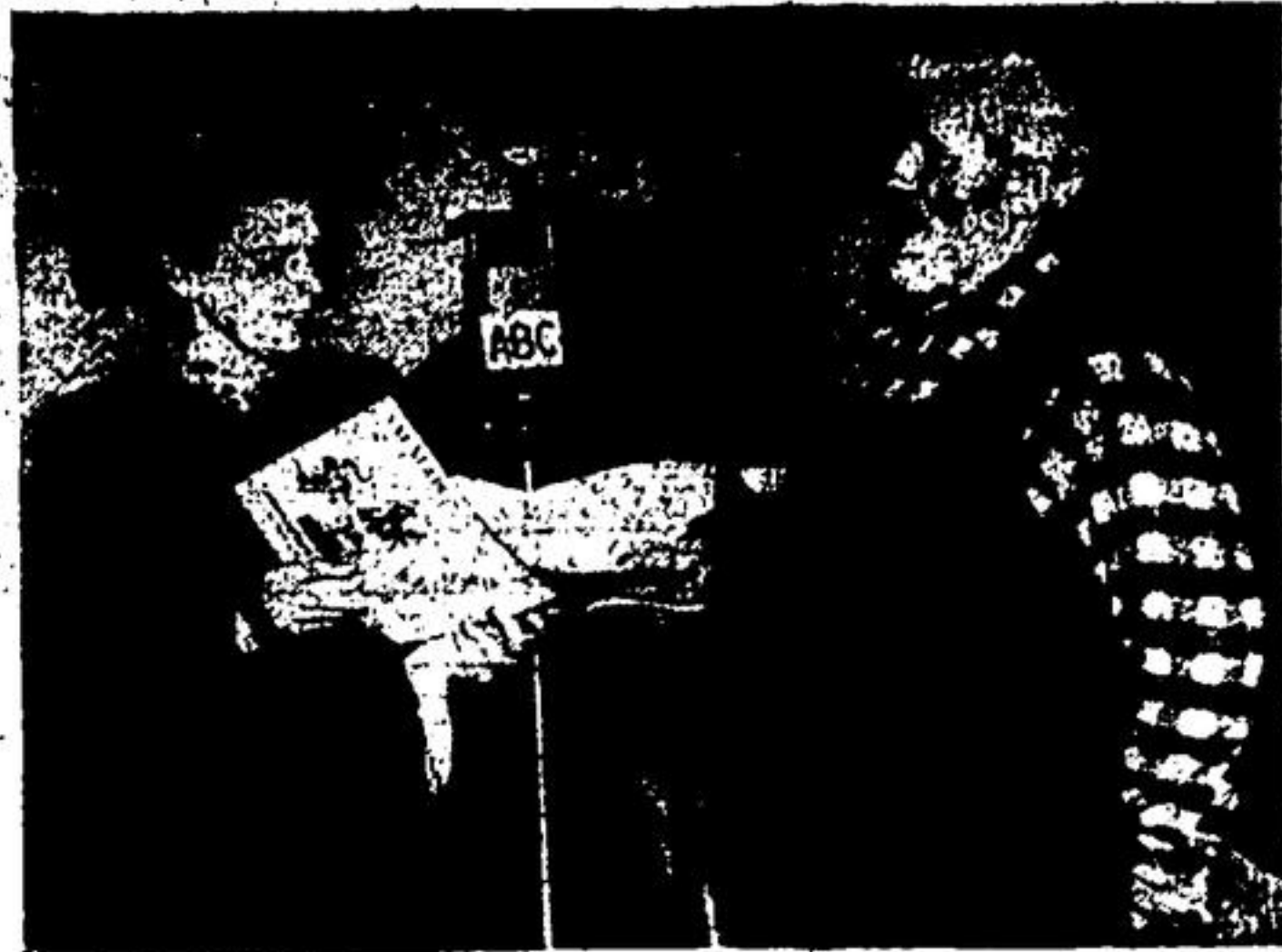
Congratulations to Mrs. E. Bridgen, who celebrated her 80th birthday.

#### BRUINS, NORVAL ARE G.R.C. CUP WINNERS

Completing the Bantam and Midget series sponsored this season by Georgetown Recreational Council, a big evening of hockey was offered before a fair crowd of sports-minded Georgetowners last Friday night in the Arena, when the playoff matches were held. Bruins defeated the Maple Leafs by an 8-3 score to cap the Midget crown and take the John D. Kelly trophy, which was presented to team captain Keith Scott after the game by Mayor Joseph Gibbons. In the opening Bantam fixture, Norval Hornets completed their season as undefeated champs by a 5-2 win over Reds. They won the Leonard J. Bell trophy which capt. Jamie Cunningham received on behalf of his team-mates from W. G. Bell. Another presentation of the evening was the Simmons Jewellers "Good Sportsmanship" trophy, awarded to the player chosen by his team-mates for this quality. Emery Thompson, was awarded this honour with Joe Schertzl, defence star of the Hershey Bears, presenting the trophy to him. #### What Council Did

ON TUESDAY APRIL 6th.

Had a group photograph including the town clerk and press reporter taken by Albert Simson, local photographer.

Discussed possible changes in sewerage installation with engineer C. R. Hagey. Mr. Hagey said it might be feasible in order to sewer the Junction Survey on Maple Avenue to take the main sewer through private property at the foot of William Street rather than down Charles and Maple. He also said the contractor had run into trouble on Draper Street. Because of changes in the original plans through a decision to sewer War-time Housing Project 2, the sewers had to be dug deeper and quick-and had been struck. Mr. Hagey was afraid that sewer pipe laid in this would not stand up and thought a solution would be to go along Lorne Street instead. He was going to check both these possibilities on Wednesday and would advise the mayor who in turn could pass on the information to Council.

Mr. Trygve Wold of Smith and Stone, Ltd., asked Council if they intended carrying out last year's Council's decision to increase water facilities to the company's King Street plant. Pipe had been bought but the 1947 Council had not completed the job and Smith and Stone had spent a considerable amount on a temporary service which was not satisfactory for adequate fire protection. Mayor Gibbons said he was not prepared to give an answer immediately. With so many requests for new water service, he felt money would have to be borrowed and that as the town had almost reached its debenture-borrowing peak, a bank loan might be the answer. Cr. Goodlet favoured deciding what could and would be done and then notify applicants for water service what they could expect and when. Reeve Maclaren concurred with this and the Mayor expressed his agreement.

Mr. Wold also said he thought another hydrant should be installed on King Street somewhere between Clay Products and the McKibbin house on the 9th Line, as no hydrant was at present in this long expanse. He quoted the 1943 report of the Canadian Underwriters Association that hydrants should be no more than 500 feet apart. Mayor Gibbons said he thought fire protection in town was ample. Deputy Reeve Armstrong said the Ontario Fire Marshal's office governed this and no complaints had been received from the Fire Marshal.

Delegated Assessor Arnott Early to attend the Assessor's convention in London in June. (Moved by Maclaren and Davidson)

Asked the Assessor to report to Council what had been accomplished to date on the new assessment and whether it would be finished as originally stated by September 1st this year. (Moved by Goodlet and Herbert)

Received a letter from D. R. McLaughlin, RR 3, Georgetown, saying he was deeply concerned about the lack of proper exits at the Arena, and that he was forwarding a copy of his letter to the Ontario Fire Marshal. Council discussed the matter at some length and finally decided to forward a copy of the letter to the Board of Parks to draw it to their attention.

Whitnee — It has worried me too. A fire in the refreshment booth would block the main exit.

Herbert — I believe the Fire Chief has notified the Board of Fire danger.

Gibbons — I don't like the tone of this letter. He has gone over our heads and notified the Fire Marshal and it's the fire marshal's worry now.

Whitnee — It's our worry too as citizens.

Armstrong — The Board of Parks is trying to operate efficiently and can only do so much in a year.

Whitnee — You will agree that danger exists.

Armstrong — Yes.

Maclaren — He (Mr. McLaughlin) is supposed to be a friend of the municipality but he takes the attitude that we aren't going to do anything and goes over our heads.

Gibbons — As a matter of courtesy he should notify us first.

Armstrong — I agree we need more exits, but we have a Board to take care of that.

Gibbons — We will forward a copy of this letter to the Board.

Davidson — I agree with the Deputy Reeve.

Herbert — The Board has been approached both by the former fire chief and the present one.

Whitnee — If that's true they evidently need a lot of pressure before anything is done. This Council should press to have it done.

Gibbons — Undoubtedly the Fire Marshal will investigate. I should not be surprised if he hasn't already been in touch with them.

Goodlet — If he has, the door was still locked last night.

Took out insurance on the town irrader with Walter T. Evans when it was learned the comprehensive policy did not cover it.

Asked the Hydro to instal a street light on James Street between Draper and Main. (Moved by Armstrong and Hill)

Will grade the Lions Club lot beside the Post Office for a lacrosse field to be operated this summer by the Recreational Council.

Decided to hold a special meeting next week to discuss building by-law.
