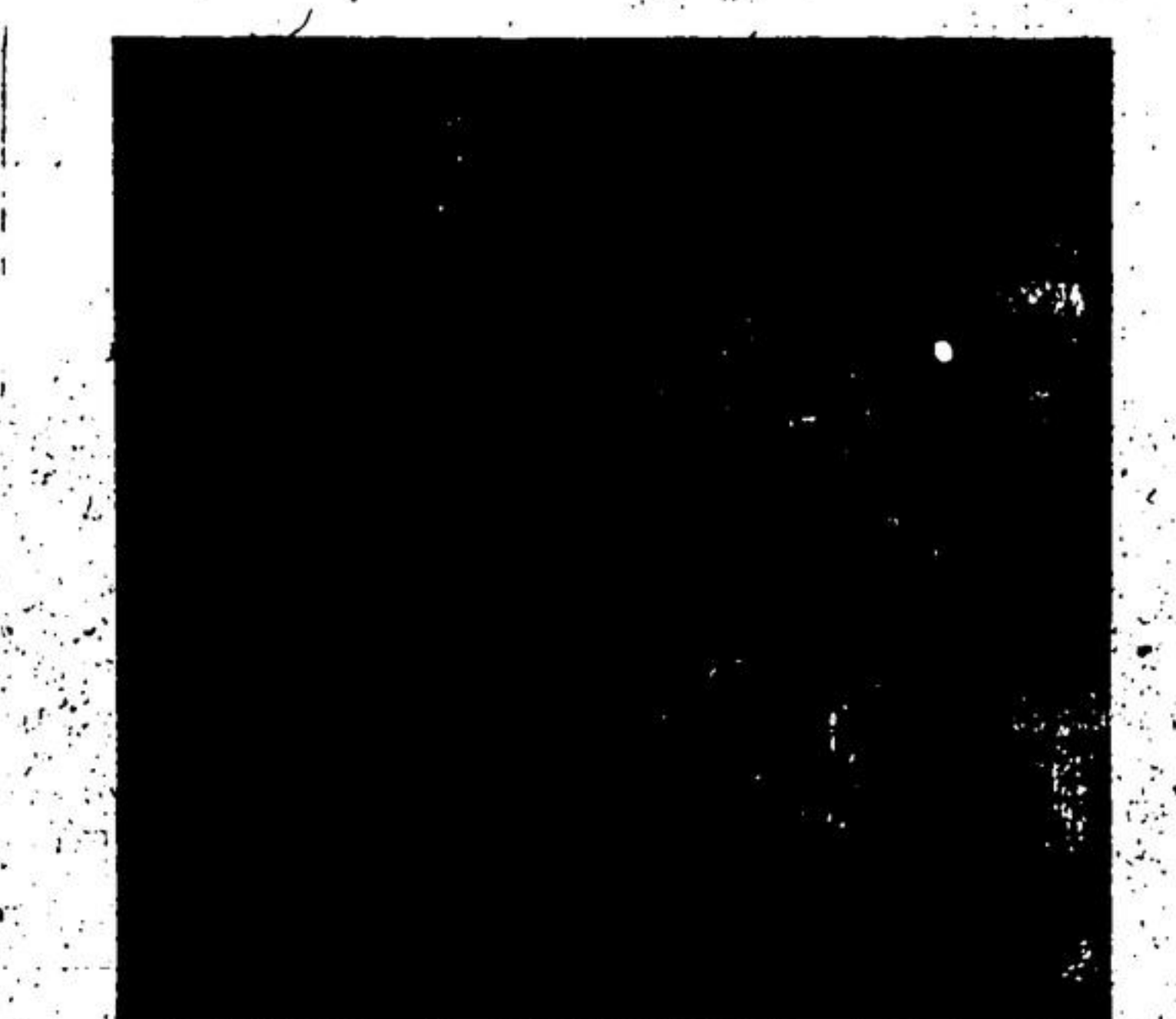

Made Pictorial Cake For Governor General

A picture on display in the Herald window this week is of interest to friends of S. Sgt. Ross Hunter. It shows a cake baked by him when he was with the Canadian Army stationed in Whitehorse, N.W.T., to honour the visit of the Governor-General, Viscount Alexander, making an inspection tour of the area in July, 1947.

The huge fruit cake measured 4 feet by 22 inches and was 4 inches thick. It took 4 1/2 hours to bake. A real work of art, it represented in its intricate multi-coloured icing, 1400 miles of the Alaska highway system and is a relief map showing mountains, trees, railways, etc. all in natural colour. Miniature vehicles were placed along the highway and the Governor-General and his party warmly complimented S. Sgt. Hunter for his artistry.
