### Georgetown - Markham Winner In Eastern Canada Finals

The winner of the Georgetown-Markham series will meet either the Dolbeau, Quebec team or a team from the Maritimes to decide the Eastern Canada championship in Intermediate "A" hockey. The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association is donating cups to winners of the Eastern and Western Finals. While it is felt that it is too late this year to stage a Canadian championship match, there is every possibility that in 1949, this will be done. Here's the story, right from the horse's mouth. Dolbeau won three straight games against Kirkland Lake and are booked to play a Maritime team. If Dolbeau wins, they will meet Georgetown (assuming of course that Georgetown are central Ontario champs), in a five-game series, playing the first two games on Ontario ice and balance in Quebec. Rumored locations for the games are Maple Leaf Gardens in Toronto and Arvida, Quebec.

If the Maritime team wins out, the entire five game series will be played on O.H.A. ice in Ontario. Gate receipts in all matches will be subsidized by the O.H.A. The first two games in Ontario have been tentatively set for April 14th and April 16th.
