Dear Miss Bessoy, Our Queen Frederike with our King Paul is coming to visit our School and she has given to the poor girls of my cass addresses of good and humane American ladies who can help us with used clothes. She has given to me your address I had not money to send you my letter but my aunt has given to me. I take the courage to beg you to help me and to send me dear lady the old-clothes of you of your mother and of your sisters. We are very poor and I have nothing to wear. My name is Rena and I am the eldest 18 years old tall and thin. I am an orpheline my father and my mother died during this terrible war and during the war we have lost all our fortune. I live now with my aunt and uncle but they have to buy for me new clothes. I have a sister 16 years old and a brother 14. I go in the school I am in the last class of Gymnassium. I learn English, French and typewriting and I am a nice and good girl. With my next letter I will send you donr Miss Bessey the picture of me of my brother and of my sister and of my aunt and my uncle. My aunt is the sister of my mother and she has taken -us in her house when my parents died. She takes care about us and she loves me but she is also very poor. In our country all the people are very poor and we suffer terrible. We have nothing to wear and not to much to eat. I beg you dear Miss Bessey to be so kind to help me. If you have some old used clothes for me and for my aunt I will be very very thankful to you if you send to me this used clothes. My aunt is fat and hight and I and my sister we are tall and thin. We love American people very much and J love you also Miss Bessey without to know you dear Miss.
