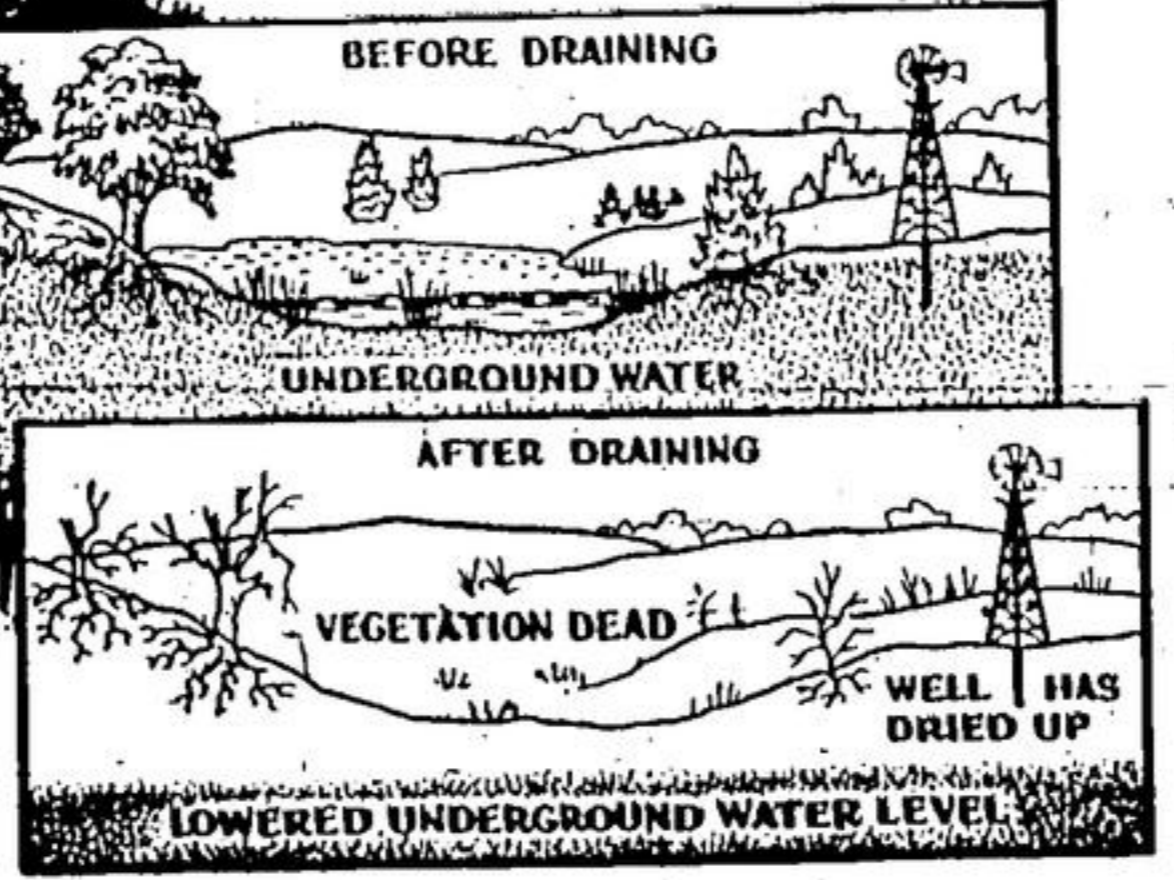

The Woodland Swamp...



Cool woodland swamps and open sunny marshes provide homes for waterfowl, beavers and muskrats. They help maintain the underground water-level, assisting the farmer through the dry summer months. The diagrams below show how the draining of swamps often causes wells to dry up, destroys vegetation, paves the way for spring floods. A soil expert should be consulted before a marsh or swamp is drained, to make sure that the project will serve a worthwhile purpose; drained land is sometimes useless for agriculture.
