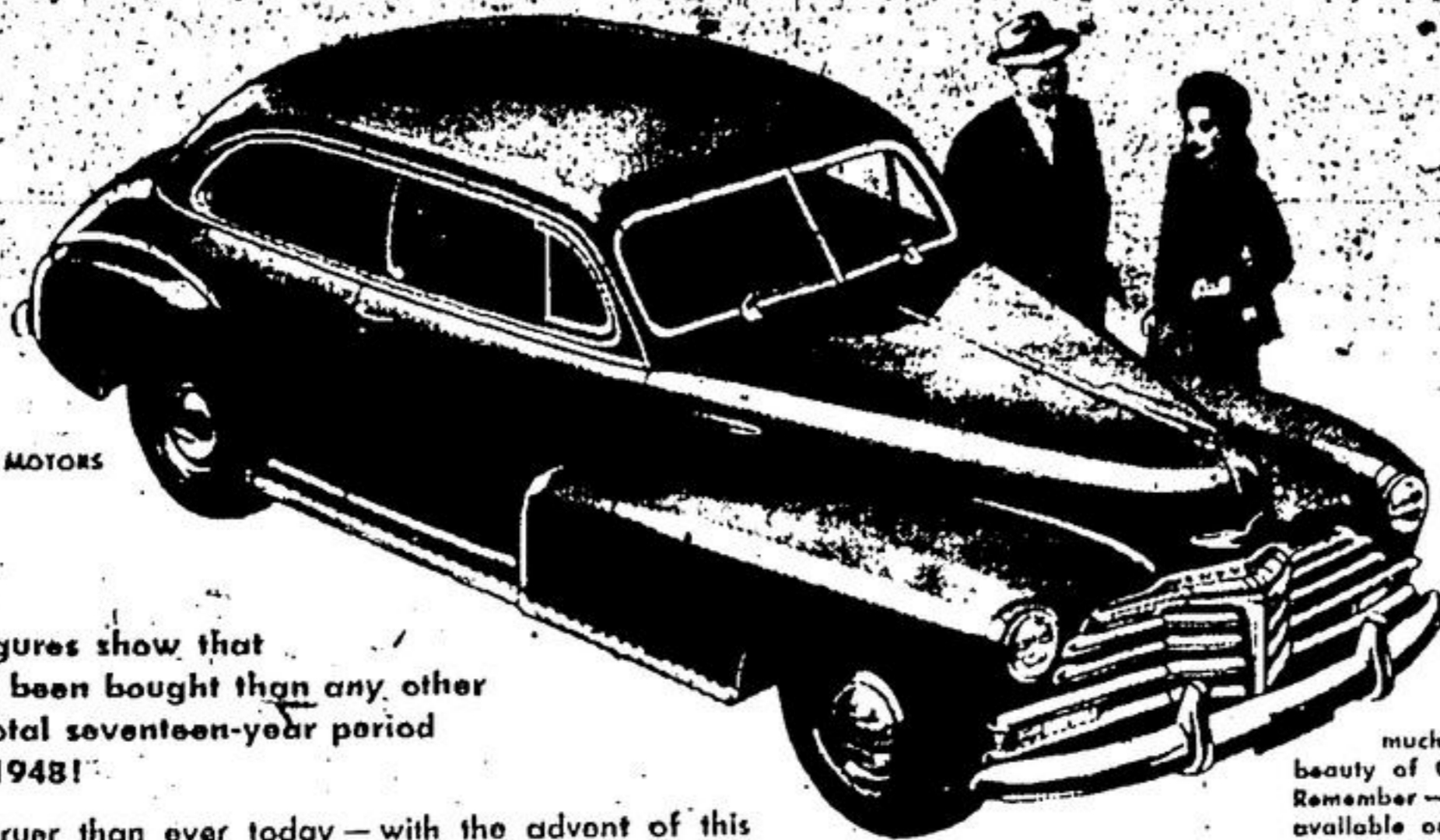

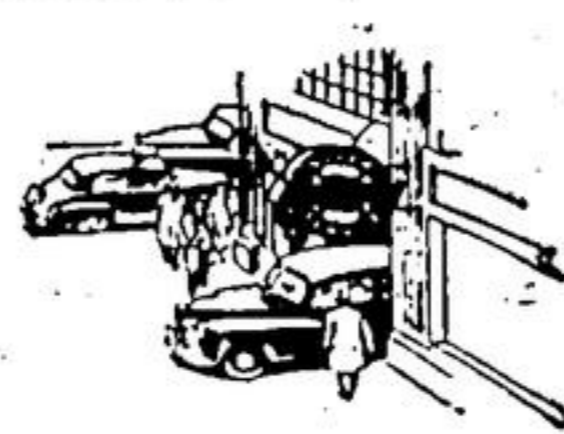

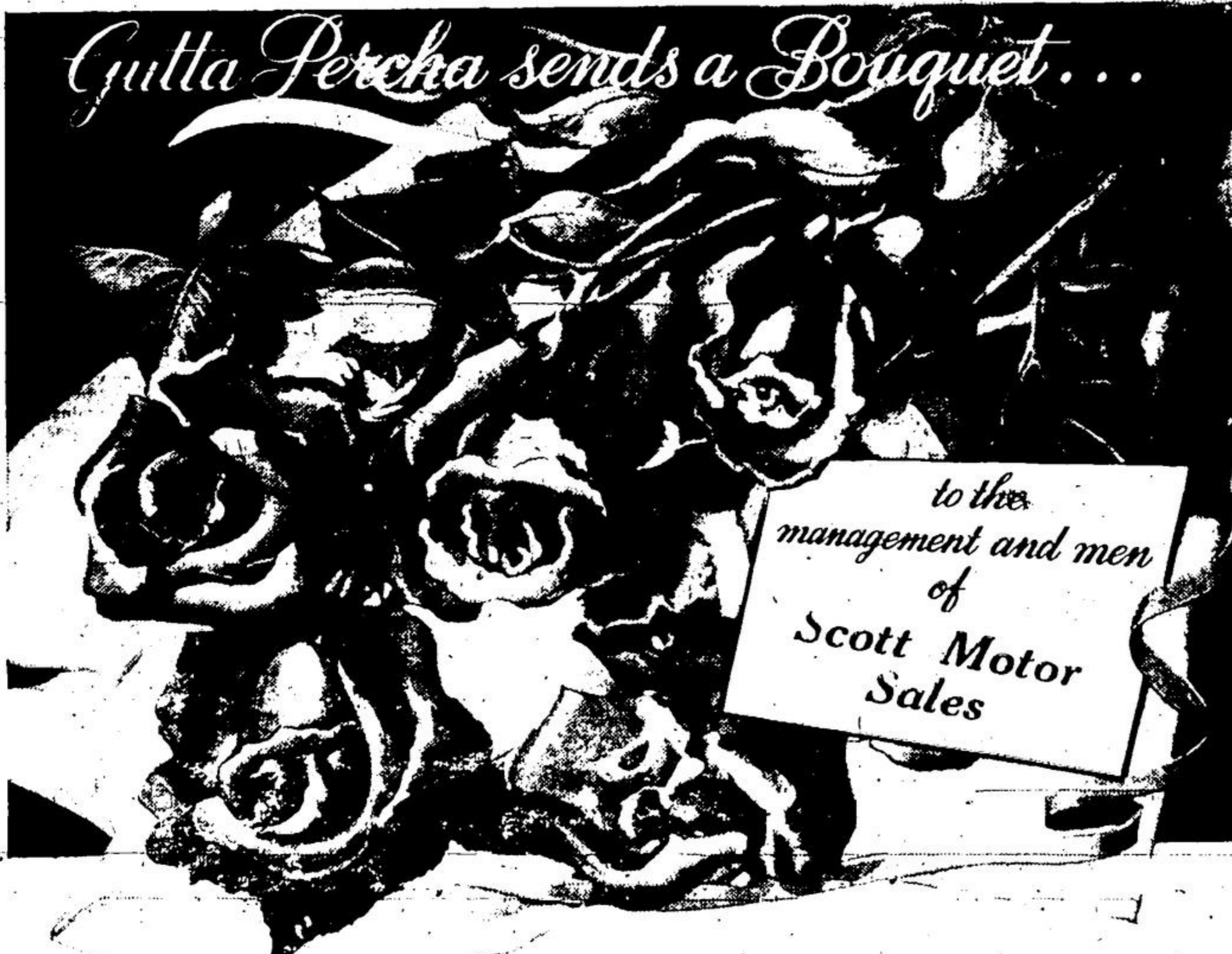

NEWS AND ITEMS OF INTEREST TO HALTON FARMERS

FEATHERSTONE BROTHERS HONOURED

During the past year we've heard and read a good deal in the County press about our winning baseball and hockey teams; but on Tuesday evening, April 13, recognition was paid to one of the many outstanding achievements in Agriculture of the past year. This was a complimentary banquet to Jack and Bill Featherstone of Tinsdale Township, in recognition of the achievement of their sixteen-year-old cow, Fairy Bluelight Zana in breaking the Canadian Long Distance record for Jerseys in Canada. The previous record had stood for ten years but old "Zana" under the able management of Featherstone Bros. recently completed a record which brings her total lifetime production up to 146,810 lbs. of milk and 7,380 lbs. of Butterfat, which is the equivalent of approximately 9,975 lbs. of butter which at present prices is worth nearly \$7000.00. As pointed out by Jas. Bremner, Secretary of the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club, if we had more cows of Zana's ability under the skillful management of such outstanding herdsmen as Jack and Bill Featherstone there would be no shortage of butter in Canada.

The Milton Town Hall was filled to capacity with guests present from Woodstock on the west and Ottawa on the east. The banquet was in the opinion of many of the guests, the best they had attended in many a moon — quite a feather in the cap of the ladies of the Scotch Block Women's Institute. The Canadian Jersey Cattle Club and the Halton Jersey Club were joint sponsors of the function.

Owing to the difficulty of having Zana present in person, those in charge had arranged a pyramid of 178 fifty-six pound butter boxes to represent her lifetime production.

Wm. Davies, president of the Halton Jersey Club extended greetings on behalf of his organization, following which Jas. Bremner of the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club, and Agricultural Representative J. E. Whitlock were the joint toastmasters of the evening.

Colonel the Honourable T. L. Kennedy, Minister of Agriculture for Ontario, was the guest speaker, being introduced by Stanley Hall, M.P.P. Col. Kennedy ably portrayed the tremendous resources of the Province and the blessings and privileges being enjoyed by Canadians in contrast to conditions in other countries he had visited during the past year. He pointed out that the prosperity and well being of a country depends not only on the top six inches of soil but also on the top six inches of man — in short the brain power utilized in the development of those resources.

W. D. Thompson of Brooklin, vice-president of the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club, presented Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Featherstone with a beautiful silver serving tray, suitably engraved while a similar gift was presented by Harry Collins of Woodstock, president of the Ontario Jersey Club, to Jack Featherstone. Prof. Geo. E. Raithby of Guelph saw to it that the other ladies of the Featherstone family were not overlooked and in a few well chosen words presented bouquets of roses to Mrs. Featherstone, mother and sister respectively of Jack and Bill.

Others who brought greetings were W. R. Reek, M.B.E., President of the Ontario Agricultural College, Harry Hays, representing the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada; and Lloyd Chisholm, President of the Halton Guernsey Club.

Selections by the Halton Melody Eight, Halton's outstanding Double Male Quartette, and Fred David of Kibride, the versatile comedian, completed a well rounded and outstanding evening's programme.

That the event was indeed noteworthy was indicated by the numerous letters and telegrams of congratulations received from all parts of the Dominion and U.S.A.
