AFRICAN MISSIONARY SPEAKS TO W.M.S.

The Easter-Thanksgiving Meeting of The Women's Missionary Society of Georgetown United Church was held in the Sunday School room on Tuesday, April 13 at 3 o'clock. Mrs. W. A. Nielsen and later Mrs. R. C. Todd presided. The theme for this meeting was Discipleship.

Miss Shortill and Mrs. Smith of Ballinafad W.M.S. conducted the worship service, based on the last words of Jesus before his ascension—His commission to His Disciples. Present day confusion and strife can only be overcome by faithful discipleship on the part of Christ's followers. Hymn 360—"Take up thy cross, if thou would my disciple be," closed the devotional.

Miss Barbara Dawson, accompanied by her mother at the piano, sang the Lord's Prayer most pleasingly.

Miss Marie Crosby was the special speaker. She told of her work as a teacher in Means School, Angola, Africa—of the very poor natives among which they work, who have their sorrows and joys as we have. All work very hard. They make wonderful progress in learning to read. The mothers are taught how to keep their homes, how to give first aid, personal cleanliness, which all leads up to Christ's love and sacrifice for them. The mothers pass these teachings on to their children. The missionary nurses care for the babies and thus reduce the high infant mortality. Miss Crosby spoke with deep appreciation of the assistance sent them from the Woman's Missionary Society.

Mrs. A. R. Speight moved a vote of thanks to Miss Crosby. Hymn 250 "Hark the Song of Jubilee" was sung. Mrs. R. C. Todd offered the closing prayer and invited those present to remain for refreshments and a social hour.

EMPIRE MINDED DOWN MILTON WAY

In the February 15th issue of Maclean's Magazine, a letter on the Mailbag page from A. C. Lepard, Bramford, suggested that Canada should join the United States, each province becoming a state or two. In the April 1st edition, two letters were published with opposite views. It is an odd coincidence that both were written by district boys, though the magazine editor would have no indication of this as the addresses were different. One letter was written by Seymour English, a student at Milton High School and son of Mr. and Mrs. C. G. English, R. R. 5, Milton. The other letter came from George H. Michie, a school teacher at White River, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Michie also of R R 5, Milton and a graduate of Milton High.

Their letters are as follows:

A. C. Lepard's suggestion that we join the U.S. "each province a state or two" (Mailbag, Feb. 15) is ridiculous. How does he propose to divide each province? Let us take Saskatchewan, divide it into two halves, north and south. The north is too thinly populated to form a state. Thus this section would be governed as a territory from Washington, D.C. It is exceedingly unlikely that these people in northern Saskatchewan would welcome this solution. In Milton High School (where I am a student), we are accustomed to regard Canada as an independent, autonomous nation, a member of the British Commonwealth of Nations and of the United Nations, not as an insignificant satellite of the U.S. If Mr. Lepard looks upon our northern neighbours with such esteem and has so little regard for his native Canada, why does he continue to reside in Canada? — Seymour English, Milton, Ont.

We would be the forgotten people! Just when we are third rung from the top, too! Defeatists have no place in Canada! If he wants the U.S., I suggest it would be easier to move him there than the U.S. here. — George H. Michie, White River, Ont.
