## What Council Did

ON MONDAY, MAY 3

Appointed Richard Hawes as Building Inspector. He will receive a fee of 75 per cent of all receipts from building licences.

(Moved by Goodlet and MacLaren)

Asked Town Solicitor K. M. Langdon for an opinion as to the legality of John Cordaro proceeding with erecting a small frame building on the vacant lot adjoining his Main Street business block.

Mr. Cordaro appeared at the meeting to ask what his position was as he had received a letter from the town clerk advising him he could not proceed without Council's consent. He explained that the building would be moved back of the lot for a garage later on when a permanent brick building was erected. A month ago he had seen the mayor who advised him there was nothing to stop him building and he had gone ahead and bought materials and contracted with a carpenter for the building. The new by-law was meanwhile passed and he did not think it fair that he should be put in the position of being unable to proceed.

Whitnee — If he goes ahead and builds, it can't be assessed high enough. We passed this by-law to stop buildings like this.

Gibbons — There is a principal involved. While I didn't encourage the building, I said there was nothing at that time that could stop it, and I was quite right.

Cordaro — I received this letter today telling me to come to Council.

Gibbons — I didn't know this letter went out.

Herbert — Who authorized it? McCumber — How can he get a permit if we have no building inspector?

Goodlet — The by-law came into effect after he started building. I would advise Mr. Cordaro to see his lawyer and get an opinion.

Whitnee — If we can prevent this building going up, we are doing the citizens a favour.

Goodlet — The by-law has to stand and we can't make exceptions. Whatever it says must be the rule.

Gibbons — We will ask Mr. Langdon for an opinion on such cases, as others are bound to arise. I don't think two of them will look any worse than one.

Herbert — I think he should be given every consideration. I didn't think it a good idea at first but the discussion tonight has changed my mind.

Armstrong — I will reserve my decision until I hear the Town Solicitor's opinion.

Granted \$100 to the Esqueing Agricultural Society, in place of \$200 last year, after an amendment granting \$150 was defeated.

(Recorded vote. McCumber, Whitnee, Herbert and Hill voted for the amendment, which was moved by Hill, Herbert, Gibbons, Armstrong, Goodlet and Davidson voting against. Reave MacLaren was absent at time of voting. The motion for \$100, moved by Davidson and Whitnee, carried, Herbert and Hill voting against.)

Perc Cleave, Nels Robinson and Craig Reid appeared to ask for this annual grant and it was explained that the estimates had been pared to the bone and Council could not exceed budgeted expenditures. Several members who voted against the \$150 pointed out that there was no animosity but that they had to follow principles laid down.

Granted use of the park on September 18 to the Esqueing Agricultural Society for their fair.

(Moved by Armstrong and Goodlet)

Mr. E. B. Tyers asked about water service to his farm (the former Cedarvale Farm) which he had been promised a year ago. Mayor Gibbons said that at present there were at least \$13,000 worth of such services pending and nothing could be done until some method of financing was decided. Cr. Goodlet said that in view of the promise made by a former council something should be done and Mr. Tyers was told that some decision would be made in the near future.

Renewed the comprehensive insurance policy with A. E. Wilson and Co. (Elmer Thompson, local agent) for a 3-year period at a yearly cost of \$593.12 payable annually. Mr. Wilson was present to suggest the longer renewal, pointing out that rates were rising. Last year the premium was \$476 and thirteen claims paid totalled \$575. A one-year renewal would cost \$712.05.

(Moved by Whitnee and Herbert)

Town Assessor Arnott Early reported that just over two hundred houses had been assessed to date under the new system and that he was aiming at September, 1949, to have the job completed. The County Assessor had told him Georgetown was well out in front in work on the new system.

Stan Allen asked whether sewerage would take care of the disposal of waste from the Alliance Paper Mills and was told by Engineer C. H. Hagey that it would. He also asked about sewerage Papermill Road, but was told this had not been provided for because the cost of an extra pumping station would be excessive. There was a chance that the first few houses on the street could be hooked into the present system. Mr. Hagey also reported that the sewerage hook-up to Wartime Housing Project 2 would be completed this week.

Voted to give a token of recognition to players of the championship Intermediate hockey team, with Crs. Goodlet and Whitnee a committee to arrange it.

Reave MacLaren reported that he, the Mayor and Deputy-Reave had met with the Lorne Scots Band executive to discuss the band's future. At present the band receives no assistance from the army and can get no grant from the town because it is a military band. The committee promised assistance in canvassing to raise \$1200 for uniforms and supporting a money vote if the band should decide to become a Citizens' Band.

Cr. Goodlet said something should be done about a foot-bridge over the creek at the foot of Ewing St. There were no railings on the bridge and a child fell off last week and was almost drowned. The matter was left with the Road Committee.

**WIDOW OF FORMER PUBLISHER DIES**  
Mrs. Joseph M. Moore, widow of the late publisher of the Herald, passed away at her home in Georgetown on Sunday, April 25th, after an illness of some months' duration. The former Amy Claridge, she was a daughter of the late Jeremiah Claridge and Mary Graham and was born on a farm near Stewartstown. She had resided in Georgetown since her marriage and was a member of the United Church and of the Local Council of Women. She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. W. R. S. Douglas (Aileen) of Toronto, two grandchildren, John and Mary Elaine Douglas, and a sister, Miss Roselle Claridge of town. Her husband predeceased her in November, 1939.

The funeral service last Tuesday was conducted by Rev. John McDermid of Brampton. Pall bearers were W. A. Wilson, Graham Parnell, Francis Thompson, R. B. Foulis, and John and William Schreiter of Kitchener. Interment was made in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.
