The second regular meeting of Halton Presbytery for 1948, met at Bethel Church, of the Hornby Charge, on Tuesday, April 27. The morning session of Presbytery was opened with the Communion Service, with the Chairman, Rev. N. J. Trux in charge, assisted by the pastor of the church, Rev. Fred Ainsworth.

During the business which followed, the following officers for 1948-49 were elected: Chairman, Rev. Ross R. Hare, Milgrove; Secretary, Rev. O. R. Plindall, Ballinafad; Treasurer, Mr. R. F. Sanderson, Oakville. Commissioners nominated to General Council were, Rev. N. J. Trux, Carlisle, and Mr. Thomas Ballm, Waterdown. Alternates were, Rev. R. W. O'Brien, Burlington, and Mr. W. N. Gilbert, Bronte.

Rev. David Gallagher, Associate secretary of Overseas Missions, and a former member of the Presbytery, gave a very interesting account of his experiences as one of a United Church Missionary Delegation to visit the Overseas Missions in India, China, Japan, and Korea.

Two calls were before the Presbytery for endorsement: Rev. W. T. R. Devoe of Wooler, in the Cobourg Presbytery; Day of Quinte Conference, to succeed Rev. Simon Edwards at Bronte; and Rev. John Smith of Old Wyndham Charge, in Haldimand-Norfolk Presbytery. Hamilton Conference, to succeed Rev. K. C. Todd at Georgetown. Rev. J. L. Blair, the newly-inducted minister at Milton was introduced to the Presbytery.

**FIFTY PER CENT REDUCTION OF DOWN PAYMENTS ON NEWLY CONSTRUCTED LOWER COST HOUSES UNDER THE HOUSING DEVELOPMENT ACT (ONTARIO)**


The Province of Ontario will arrange for the loan of fifty per cent of the difference between the amount of the first mortgage and the sale price of a newly constructed house, the Provincial advances not to exceed \$1,250.00 on any one house. The loan will be repayable on a twenty year amortization plan with interest at 3 1/2 per cent per annum. Satisfactory evidence will be required that the amount of the first mortgage advance is a reasonable proportion of the value.
