Wm. Deans is Children's Aid President

Mr. William Deans of Georgetown was the newly elected President of The Children's Aid Society of the County of Halton at their Annual Meeting held in the Sunday School Room of St. Paul's United Church on Tuesday evening, May 4th. A splendid attendance representing all parts of the County, and numerous guests were present, to hear reports on the year's activities, and at the same time listen with interest to Mr. Stewart Sutton, Director of the Children's Aid Society of Toronto, a very fascinating and inspiring guest speaker.

Mr. Frank Thompson made a few comments in presenting his report stressing the break-down in home ties of so many families which might be attributed to the aftermath of the second World War and a feeling of insecurity on the part of many people insofar as the future is concerned.

The Financial Statement for the year showed payments amounting to \$16,375.12, with a Bank Overdraft of \$265.47, a slight decrease over a year ago.

Mrs. Hazel Bucknam, Elocutionist of Burlington, in presenting two groups of very fine numbers, made a most welcome variation in the

meeting. Besides representatives from the neighbouring Societies of Guelph, Hamilton and Peel, the Society was indeed honoured this year in having present at their meeting representatives from the Protestant Children's Home, and two carloads from the Provincial Department of Child Welfare. The President also introduced Miss Eileen Duffy who will commence her duties as Social Worker with the Society on September 1st.
