Dr. Allnutt Guest Speaker at Bible Meeting

Dr. F. B. Allnutt was guest speaker at the annual meeting of Georgetown Bible Society last Wednesday in the Baptist Church. He pointed out that the Bible is printed in hundreds of languages and in China alone there are forty-five million new readers since 1940. At least 25 million copies are to be printed in the Chinese language and sent to China. The sound film "The Book for the World of Tomorrow" was shown, illustrating how the Bible was first printed in the ancient Greek and later translated into English in the King James version.

Rev. O. R. Gower, pastor of the church, conducted the devotional period. A sacred number was presented by the mixed quartette of the church. J. D. Godfrey presided and introduced the guest speaker. Mr. Godfrey and Watson Winfield were re-elected president and secretary-treasurer respectively. Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson closed the meeting with prayer.
