CONTROL OF TUBERCULOSIS

Halton Health Unit Press Release

The fight against tuberculosis is being won. Since 1900 the death rate has been cut in four. However, only by continued effort can the present rate be lowered. The fact that there are still more than 5500 deaths annually in Canada from tuberculosis shows we are far short of complete victory.

One important factor in the control of tuberculosis is the provision of facilities for early discovery of cases and the means for the adequate follow up of these and their contacts.

By your contributions to the Halton County Christmas Seal Campaign you have made possible an efficient and thorough program for case finding and follow up in Halton County. Last year a mass x-ray survey was conducted in the 5 towns in the county. This was paid for by your donations to the Christmas Seal Sale. In all 12,569 people were x-rayed and 29 cases of tuberculosis were discovered. It would have been useless to discover these cases if no facilities were available for following them up and to see that their contacts were examined. This has been done. Monthly x-ray clinics are held in Oakville and Milton and the facilities of clinics in Guelph, Hamilton and Toronto are also used.

Clinics in Oakville and Milton are excellent examples of the co-operative effort needed to achieve results in tuberculosis control. The hospitals make their facilities available at nominal cost, the x-rays are paid for by the Christmas Seal Committee, the County Health Unit provides the staff to operate the clinics, and the Ontario Department of Health interprets the x-rays.

During the coming summer it is planned to cover these areas of the county where x-rays were not done last year. This will involve the use of mobile clinics throughout the rural areas. In mass x-ray surveys it is not considered desirable to do children unless there has been history of contact with tuberculosis since younger children rarely show the disease. This means that about 80 per cent of the population should be x-rayed. In the survey conducted last year 38 per cent of the population had chest x-rays taken, which leaves about 7,000 in Halton who should be x-rayed during the coming summer. The Christmas Seal Committee will again pay the cost of this mass survey.

In the past when you have sent your donation to the Christmas Seal Committee you may have wondered how your money was being spent. The above summary will give you your answer. Each dollar contributed is spent in the most efficient manner to discover cases at the earliest possible moment and, when these cases are found, to provide facilities for thorough and continuing follow up of the cases and their contacts. It is money well spent and will give you a real return in
