W. J. Switzer Was Prominent Church Worker
William John Switzer an old pioneer of the Norval district passed away on Sunday, May 9 at his late residence, Norval. Born in Garafraxa Township 83 years ago, he moved when he was quite young with his parents into the Norval Community where he engaged in farming. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. George Switzer and is survived by his widow Margaret Edith Mino, and two sisters, Mrs. George Campbell and Mrs. William Dawson, both of Toronto. The funeral service was held at his late residence, and the family minister, Rev. P. J. Dunlop officiated.

Mr. Switzer was a member and held important positions in the former Norval Methodist Church and entered into the United Church where he held the position of Elder for a number of years. He was one of the trustees of that church. He was a man of high ideals and strong convictions and did much for the moral and spiritual uplift of the community. Many neighbours, friends and relatives were present to offer their silent tribute of sympathy and respect.

Industrial Bowling Banquet

The Industrial Bowling League completed their season with a banquet last Friday at the McGibbon House. About 35 members from the four teams competing this season — the Combines, Provincial, Alliance and Smith and Stone — sat down to partake of an excellent dinner.

Al Norton, the genial owner of the Lucky Strike Bowling Club was the chairman for the evening. Al spoke of the coming season and said he hoped to see a larger league with possibly 6 or 8 teams competing. He said also that the past season had been a very successful one, especially since this was the first year of bowling. Al called on Alf Kirby, the captain of the Alliance team for a few words. Alf spoke with high respect as to the sportsmanlike way in which the league had been conducted the past season and also that in his ten years of bowling in different leagues, he had not had the pleasure of bowling with more congenial bowlers.

Al Norton then called on the captain of the Smith and Stone team, Ev Wilson, to accept the "Lucky Strike Annual Award" trophy in recognition of his team winning this trophy. Ev thanked Al and said that he hoped Smith and Stone would be on the trophy as season winners for many years to come.

Individual trophies were to be presented by Alf Kirby to the Combine team which finished first in the regular schedule. Alf, however, tried a new approach on the presentation. After presenting Hal Gibson with his trophy, he told Hal to present a trophy to the next one, and as each player came up to claim his trophy, that player would present the next one. Each player in turn gave some timely remarks as to the past season.

Then came the time for the cash awards. Al presented the winning Combine team with first prize money of \$40.00. Second prize money of \$30.00 went to the Smith and Stone team; third prize money of \$20.00 to the Alliance team and fourth of \$10.00 to the Provincial. Cash awards were also given to Alf Kirby of the Alliance team for season's high average; to Bill Anderson (Combines) for second high average and Walter Cook (Combines) for third high average. Hugh Dickie of the Provincial team with a 404 score received an award for the high single of the year, which incidentally was the only 400 score in league bowling this year. Tom Wiley of the Provincial team, although not present, was awarded a cash prize for his high triple for the season.

After all this money had been awarded, it was decided to elect an executive body for the coming season. The following were elected: Alf Kirby — President; Ivan Crabtree — Vice-President; Bill Anderson — Secretary; Walter Cook — Treasurer. And so another venture in Georgetown was brought to a close after a very successful first season. We feel sure that all bowlers in the town and outlying districts would gladly move a vote of thanks to Al Norton for the foresight and initiative in making bowling once again a very definite sporting venture and it is hoped that in the years to come, bowling will become one of the top sports in Georgetown.

14. Organized and was chairman of the Wartime Ration Board for Oakville, Trafalgar Township and Milton.
15. Chairman of the local Branch of Civil Defense Committee.
16. Chairman of local National Clothing Collection for war ravaged countries.
17. Present Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Oakville-Trafalgar High School Area Board.
18. Has been a member of every Municipal Board in the town of Oakville.
