**Catholic Boys' School on
Moyer Farm**

The former Moyer farm on the 8th Line just out of town is now Notre Dame de Beaufregard, a Catholic boys' farm-school. The property has been purchased by Father Clovis Beaufregard, a Catholic priest who operated a similar establishment at St. Catharines for twelve years. There is accommodation for twenty French boys who take some classroom work, including English, and are taught the elements of farming. Boys are orphans or come from homes where family life has been disrupted and occasionally, in order to keep the children of one family together, their sisters are taken in also at the school. The boys range in age from 12 to 20.

Father Beaufregard was in Calgary for eight years before going to St. Catharines and at one time was engaged with the Department of Colonization in Quebec province. Directress of the school is Miss Therese St. Jean who held a similar position in St. Catharines. The project receives no government aid and is financed from a few private donations, with the farm a self-sufficient unit which produces enough food for those in residence and sale of surplus provides cash for other expenses.

The natural beauties of the location will be used to full advantage to provide a full, happy life for the young people on the farm. The property was purchased by Mr. and Mrs. M. H. Moyer in 1940 and was the former home of Professor and Mrs. H. L. Hutt, Mr. and Mrs. Moyer are now living in town in the house on the Glen Road built by Mr. R. R. McKibbin before he moved to Ottawa.

**C.C.F. MEETING
AT LIMEHOUSE**

The C.C.F. candidate for Halton, Ed Adamson, spoke in the Memorial Hall, Limehouse, last Thursday. He pointed out that the CCF in Canada was still a pioneering movement, although in Great Britain, New Zealand and Australia, it was now a firmly established idea with governments working in social democratic fashion with the welfare of people their prime consideration. Just as William Lyon Mackenzie was a rebel against the powerful interests of his day so is the C.C.F. against the great profiteering corporations of today. His outline of the C.C.F. programme was based on the accomplishments — not the promises, of the four year old Saskatchewan Government. Hospital care — \$5.00 per year, per person, takes care of the full medical and hospital care of the people. Water and Forest conservation — the crying need of the farmers — would be looked after immediately by a C.C.F. government. The deliberate antagonizing of the farmer and the labourer would be charged to co-operation which would make for better living conditions for all people. New homes, old age pensions, care of the blind, 100 per cent accident and insurance benefits, two weeks holidays with pay — all these were included in Ed. Adamson's outline of the CCF policy to help people. People First!

Bert Shave of Oakville also addressed the meeting. He mentioned some of the devices of large corporations for acquiring more capital — such as watering stock.

Premier Drew, at present engaged in promising to build Universities in Northern Ontario, was not concerned about making education available to the ordinary man's family, he said.

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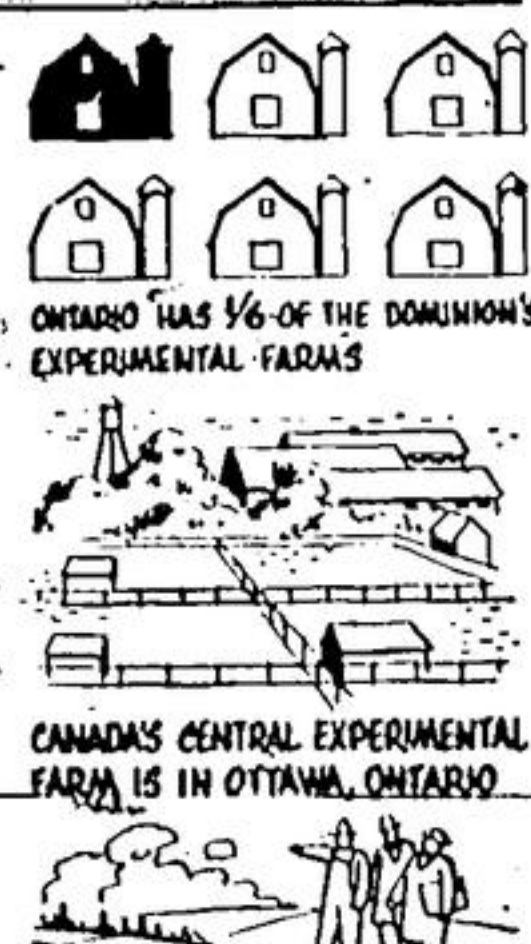
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
