IN THE MAIL BAG

Dear Mr. Editor:
The following letter is being sent to the Council and to you for publication and I trust you will be able to include it in your next issue.

To the Mayor, Reeve, Councillors of the Town of Georgetown:
May I as a taxpayer of the Town of Georgetown and a good citizen for the past 45 years, voice an opinion regarding the controversy of the building by-law.
First, this good little Town of Georgetown managed to thrive even through the worst of the depression without a Building By-Law. Any business man will tell you that Georgetown is one of the best business towns in Ontario. Why? Because up till now we had the good sense to choose as our Councillors the men who thought first of the good of the majority of our townsfolk, not of petty personal spite.

Second, in passing this By-Law, I feel that our good Councillors were unduly influenced by one person as is proof in the reading of By-Law should have been given ample time for reflection by our Councillors, not rushed through 3 readings in one night. Why the hurry, Mr. Whitmee? I feel that had our Councillors had the time to reflect on the By-Law it would never have been passed.

3rd. The By-Law is unfair to the Citizens of Georgetown, particularly to our war veterans, many of whom have cherished high hopes of a little home (if only 2 rooms) that they can call their own. By-Laws for Buildings are well and good in a time when there is lots of accommodation for all. But there are many couples, most of them veterans living in cramped quarters looking day after day for a little place or making plans to build one. Georgetown is a working man's town and working men cannot afford pretentious homes. If those people who have plenty of this world's goods have grown too big for Georgetown there is lots of room for them to expand and build in a restricted area of their own. Let Georgetown thrive by studying the working man. Keep the working man down and there will soon be no Georgetown.

Mr. Mayor, I truly sympathize with the troubles of the Council. The only remedy seems to be to put it up to the taxpayers themselves by vote. You will surely know then what the majority think and it would cause no more headaches for the Councillors.

In conclusion at your meeting of May 12, His Worship the Mayor asked that no personality be used in the Council Chamber.

Mr. Whitmee is his spiteful reference to pinball game buildings is using the Council Chamber to direct his personal spite against us. As for talk of resignation of our councillors it is only necessary for one man to resign to restore order and discipline once again at your meetings.

For Mr. Whitmee's information: No! You are entirely wrong. The building was originally intended as a monkey cage, to house spiteful councillors.

See you at the opening ball game on Saturday. Hear we have a good team.

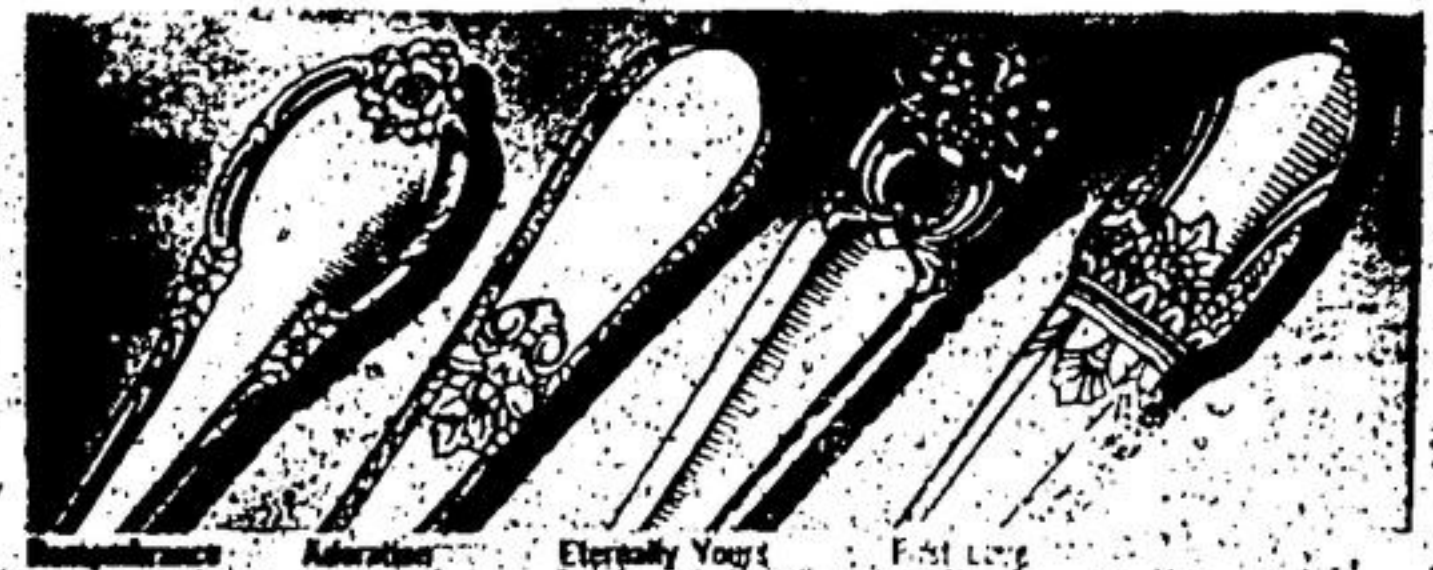
