### FRED W. NORTON WAS LONG GLEN RESIDENT

For fifty years a resident of Glen Williams, Frederick William Norton died at his home there on Wednesday, June 9th, after being bed-ridden after a stroke suffered six weeks ago. He was a son of the late James Norton and Mary Jane Allen and was born in 1867 in Churchville. He had lived in Limehouse and Teeswater and pioneered in Northern Ontario when a young man. Retired for the past five years, he had been an engineer and a spinner at the Beaumont Knitting Mills.

Mr. Norton is survived by his wife, the former Delliga Dobbie and eight children, Fred, Katherine (Mrs. Roy Hill), Roy and Thomas (Mrs. Glen Williams, Winnifred (Mrs. James Dobby) of Guelph, Alexander John of Hamilton and Allan and Elizabeth (Mrs. Joe McMenemy) of Georgetown. He was predeceased by two sons, Charles and James. There are 28 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren. He also leaves two brothers, James of Glen Williams and Allan of Limehouse and a sister, Mrs. Dennis Tracey of Glen Williams. Two sisters predeceased him, Mrs. Charles Sutherland and Mrs. Richard Marchmont.

Mr. Norton had been a member of the Orange Lodge since he was sixteen years old and belonged to the Red Cross of the Black Knights. The funeral was conducted by the Black Knights from his home on Friday, with Rev. F. J. Dunlop of Norval in charge of the service. Pall-bearers were follow-members of the Order.

Interment was made in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.
