

The railway carried 86,221,279 tons of freight, the heaviest load in its history, and the revenues from this seriness amounted to \$342,582,002: Passenger traffic had a value of \$42,017,689, the number of passengers carried being 21,226,889.

On the expense side, by far the largest item was wages. It amounted to 54.5 cents of every dollar spont for all purposes. The expendifor fuel was the next largest single item. It took 11.2 cents set of every dollar.

Operating revenues for the system in 1947 were \$438,197,980 and shoreting expenses \$397,122,607, leaving an operating net of \$11,075,573. After the payment of taxes, equipment rents, other more accounts and \$38,531,909 in interest on bonds held by the statest amounting to \$20,002,484. Thus the deficit for the year was
