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## My Trip to Milton and Halton County Council

On Tuesday, May 11, 1948, I had the privilege of representing my Public School at the Halton County Council.

Leaving home at 9:00 a.m. we arrived in Milton approximately 9:30. The trip was very enjoyable. Upon arriving we approached some huge grey stone buildings. Upon entering the County Buildings, I noticed some historical items of Halton's early times. Group pictures of members of the council may be seen also; these range from 1900 to 1947. However, we learned that Halton County was first organized in 1858. Travelling upstairs we discovered the council room, plus various other chambers.

The Council room is rectangular in shape, with benches covering two-thirds of the floor space. The remainder consisting of councillor's tables and chairs, two jury boxes one for the Grand Jury, the other for the Petit Jury. On the right and in front of the Judge's bench is the witness box, and on the opposite side the prisoner's box.

The Council opened its session with the singing of the "Lord's Prayer". Following this, the minutes of the previous meeting were read by the county clerk, Mr. Deane. One important item in the minutes which interested me especially was the granting of a sum of money to the Halton Music Festival. The reading of the minutes were then adopted on motion of Deputy Reeve Currie of Esquesing. The correspondence of the Council was then read.

Following this was the roll-call when each student gave their name

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and the name of the school which they represented. In turn we were introduced to the members of the Council. Members then conferred over administrative reports and motions. A report was received on the Peel-Halton Old People's Home, also reports on Hospitalization, Education and County Roads. Council was adjourned at 12:30, to reconvene at 2:00 p.m.

A delicious luncheon was served at 12:45 by the Mountain Union Women's Institute in St. Paul's United Sunday School. Immediately following lunch, the "Toast to the King" was proposed by Warden Cleave. A musical interlude by Milton High School Double Trio followed. The Warden then introduced Mr. Skuce, Inspector of Halton County Public Schools.

The main topic of Mr. Skuce's speech were, first, "The Dangers of Life" in which he discussed the sea and its dangers compared with the dangers of a child. Second, he gave a biography on the great leader, Abraham Lincoln. One point Mr. Skuce particularly stressed was Lincoln's favorite saying, "I will study and learn and some day my opportunity will come." This quotation greatly impressed me, and I know it will be an incentive for me to do my utmost in life.

Reeve MacLean of Georgetown moved a vote of thanks to the speaker. Later a vote of thanks was made to the ladies of the Institute and the vocal entertainers by Reeve Vanier of Niagara-on-the-Lake. The luncheon adjourned after the singing of "O Canada".

We again returned to the County Buildings, where we were shown the County Roads Department. Then we entered the car office, where we saw some well-constructed tractors, one of them was a tractor for clearing of trees. A visit to the road office was also followed, and the engineer of Governor's Road, Mr. McLean, gave us a brief description of the roads. We were shown the new asphalt roads, and the old dirt roads. We then visited the timber department, the timber being used for building roads, bridges, culverts, etc. and for the Department. In the traffic office we saw some "Highway Police" vehicles. We were then shown a film on "How to be a Polite Guest". Some of our duties are to help the people in setting crumpling cases and petrified fish. Crown Attorneys Duck related some criminal records and gave a demonstration on Court ballot boxes. Dr. Mather of the County Health Unit, stated the fact that his department did not care illness, but prevented it.

The meeting was adjourned by Warden Cleave and ended with the National Anthem.

On returning home I began to realize the great privilege that had been given to all of us in attending County Council as the representatives of our various schools. It afforded us the opportunity of studying the different phases of Municipal Government. We then had the privilege of passing it on to our fellow pupils and thus a greater knowledge of our County Government will have been derived through our visit. In promoting this special day, I feel that the County Council is doing a great work towards the education of our youth for the citizenship duties of the future.

## CANADIAN HOLSTEINS TO ITALY

Four richly bred Canadian Holstein bulls have just been shipped to Italy. This is the first shipment of Canadian Holsteins ever made to that country and it is hoped that it will mark the opening of a new export market for Canadian Holsteins that will absorb a considerable number of cattle. Shipment was made by truck to New York from where the bulls were being flown direct to Italy.

The four bulls are all high class individuals and include Eglantine Emperor Caron purchased from H. L. Guilbert, Vercheres, Que., Ludovic Rag Apple Spartan, secured from James A. McCague, Alliston, Ont., Pomona Cenogram General B bought from Bert Thornton, Thaneford and Linie Lodge Duke Columbus from Norlock Farm, Beachville, Ont.

The Guilbert bull is going to the farm of Count Albertini who operates a herd of 1700 cows. This bull was purchased at the recent National Holstein Sale at Oakville for the second highest price for a bull of \$3,600. The McCague bull and the Norlock Farm bull were purchased by the prominent Italian firm of "Cirio" that has several important farms with as many as 1600 cows on each. The McCague bull is sired by Talianian and is out of a daughter of the five times All-Canadian "Markman" while the Norlock bull is bred by Abetweit Iron Duke and is out of an 884 lb. dam. The Thornton bull goes to "Tenuta S. Donato d'Albinia, Grosseto. This herd of 700 cows is considered one of the best in Italy."

Accompanying the shipment is Albert Stagg from Toronto.

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
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
