At Norval on Sunday, Rev. Canon T. G. Wallace of London, a former rector of Norval and Georgetown, preached in the morning at the 102nd anniversary of St. Paul's Church of England. It is interesting to note that Canon Wallace was rector here at the time St. Alban's Church was built in the Glen. Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson preached in St. Paul's in the evening with Canon Wallace taking the service at St. George's.

At the morning service at St. George's Church, Rev. A. E. Ongley, youth chaplain of the diocese, was in charge of a special service to which children of the Sunday School brought their parents.
