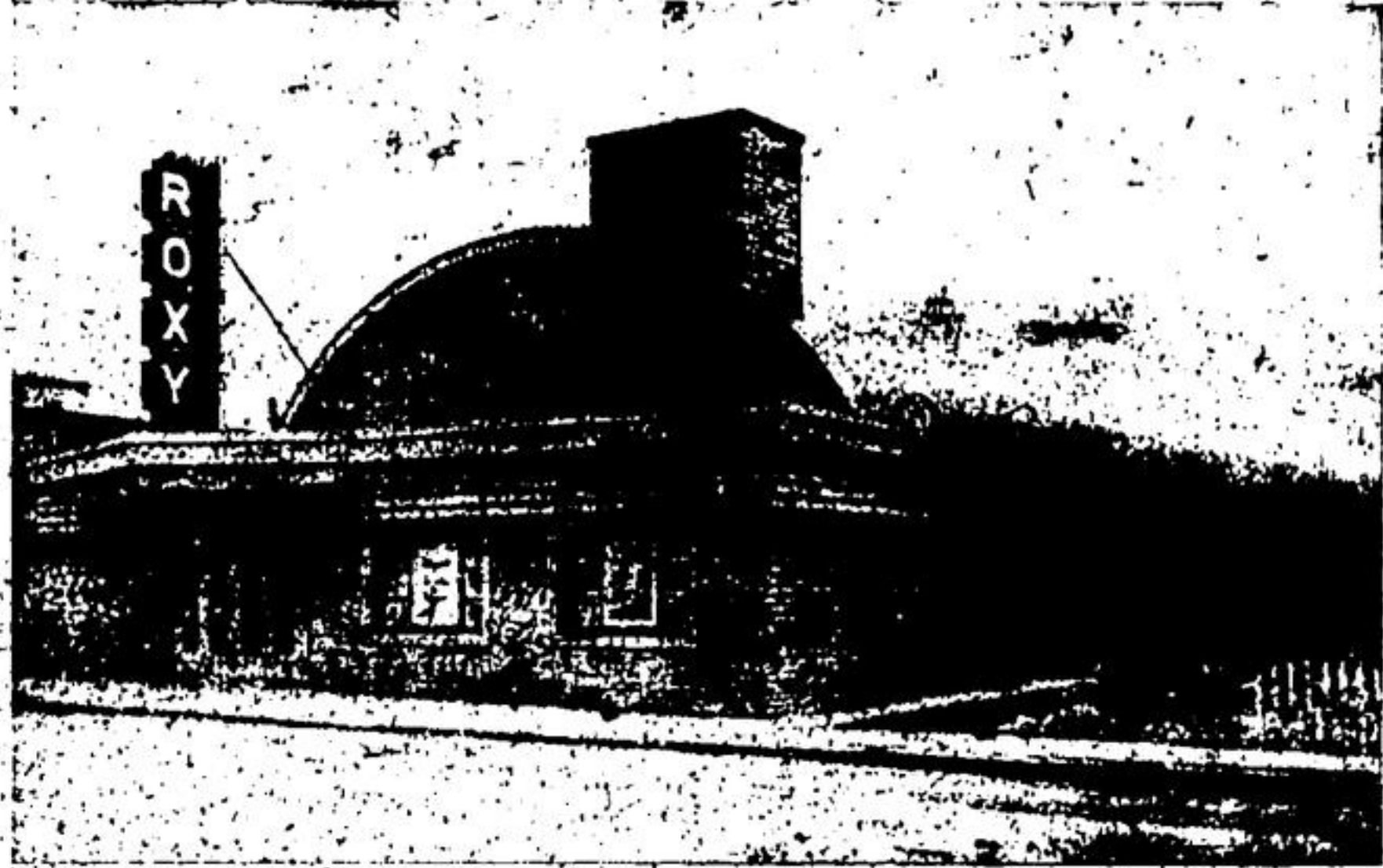

**Brampton Theatre is Innovation in Theatre Construction**



Following a year of study and research into theatre building costs in smaller communities, initiated by the J. Arthur Rank interests in Canada, a new type of construction has been evolved, and the first such structure, the 518-seat Roxy Theatre in Brampton completed and opened.

The Roxy, built by Sam Fingold and Ralph Dale, Canadian associates of the British film magnate, combine prefabricated and traditional methods, resulting in greatly lowered costs it is stated, and a thoroughly modern, fireproof and convenient building.

For the auditorium, prefabricated steel of the arched Quonset style is used. This can be erected on a previously built foundation in seven to fourteen days. The seating capacity may vary from 800 to 750 and a stage or platform, to make the building suitable for meetings, concerts and amateur plays, can be economically included if desired.

The inside of the building is the same general type as the outdoor bandshell used among others, by the Canadian National Exhibition. The plastering system combines insulation against heat loss, sound treatment for perfect acoustics and decoration. The Brampton case demonstrated that such buildings are economically and easily heated, that lighting and similar problems are simplified.

The front of this new type of theatre is varied to suit local conditions and preferences, especially to permit use of local materials and workmanship and to fit the community which it is to serve. This

section is really a separate structure, tied into the prefabricated steel of the auditorium.

In Brampton, local sandstone has been used with wood trim. This section contains the lobby, lounge, rest rooms, offices and the building's heating and ventilating equipment. In the interior, it is attractively finished in knotty Canadian pine.

According to the research group involved, the savings effected by prefabrication and by standardizing of equipment, such as seats, carpets and projection machines, result in a thoroughly modern community building which is economically practical in areas which had previously had no theatres. This applies equally to districts where present theatres have become obsolete or unserviceable and present inflated construction costs prevent their replacement.

This objective was one of the reasons behind the original research and study. In announcing this some months ago, Hon. J. Earl Lawson, K.C., president of the J. Arthur Rank organization of Canada, said that modern theatre facilities were among the services now considered essential by communities which were trading centres and drew business from surrounding rural areas. They were equally important from the standpoint of the recreational opportunities which communities need in order to keep their own younger generations satisfied and

contented. He considered it most important to discover means of making such facilities readily available in all communities. He felt that efforts should be made to limit the trend, common to all places of every size, toward travel to still larger ones seeking entertainment or recreation.

Research into this style of building will continue, it is announced. In Britain, the J. Arthur Rank interests are working on a new type of motion picture projector, to be available at approximately one-half the cost of standard machines now available which will be tested in Canada in one of these new smaller theatres. Studies are also being made of a combination community building with a dual auditorium; one with a slanted floor, screen, projection booth and stage for movies, concerts, plays and meetings; the other with a flat floor and kitchen equipment for dances, banquets and similar gatherings. The double building would have a single front containing heating equipment, lounge and washrooms, offices and ticket windows.

A second theatre similar to the Brampton one has been opened in Acton. In this district, such buildings can be completed in 90 days. Messrs. Fingold and Dale say that results of the investigations are available to representatives of interested communities in any part of Canada.
