DONALD HARRIS DIES FROM MENINGITIS

The Union community was shocked last week to learn of the sudden death of Donald Harris of Brampton. The boy first showed signs of illness Thursday while visiting the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. George Harris of Union and passed away on Friday. The alarmed grandparents immediately telephoned Dr. W. H. Brydon of Brampton and took Donald back to his home. Both Dr. Brydon and Dr. Freed were on hand to offer treatment but Donald died enroute to Brampton.

The Peel County coroner immediately called Dr. MacDonald of the health unit and an autopsy was performed, at the same time taking precautionary measures to isolate the members of the family.

Just the day previous to Donald's death, his twin brother, Douglas, was kicked by a horse, but escaped with slight bruises.

Burial took place in Norval Cemetery on Saturday evening.

Dr. I. H. Erb of Toronto performed an autopsy after the boy's death and reported that meningitis germs were in the spinal fluid. Death came, however, before meningitis was fully developed.

The germs he found were similar to those which cause epidemic meningitis. The infection originated with a carrier of the disease in whom the usual symptoms and illness were not apparent, Dr. Erb explained.

Dr. G. D. H. MacDonald, in charge of the Peel County Health Unit, said he was satisfied suitable measures had been taken to prevent a general outbreak in the district.

In the more common forms of meningitis, the Toronto doctor said, modern drugs and methods of treatment can combat the disease. With the Harris child, infection had spread so rapidly through the blood stream it was too late to prolong life.

Dr. W. H. Brydon of Brampton, who examined Donald's twin brother, Douglas, said he found no traces of meningitis. He proposed, however, to maintain observation on the boy.

In the comparative few cases of this type he had encountered, Dr. Erb said death ensued within 24 hours. In septicaemia, poison circulates through the system with a rapidity which defies medicine.
