SEAGRAM CUP TOURNEY SLATED FOR VANCOUVER

A golf course bearing a name famous in Canadian history, situated in an exclusive West Coast district and yet with city street cars almost at its front door, will play host to some of the world's greatest golfers in September when the big names of golf in Canada, the United States and South Africa tee off in quest of the Canadian Open title, the Seagram Gold Cup and \$10,000 in prize money.

The course is Vancouver's Shaughnessy Golf Club, located in the midst of expensive suburban homes of the Shaughnessy Heights district and yet only a short distance from the center of the city. The 18-hole layout, first developed by the Canadian Pacific Railway and named after C.P.R.'s Lord Shaughnessy, was completed in 1912 — second golf course in Vancouver.

Since that time, Shaughnessy has been the scene of many western tournaments and has tested the capabilities of plenty of golfing notables, amateur and professional. It even numbers a United States president among its guests, President Harding having played there in 1923.

While this year's Seagram Gold Cup play is expected to set a new high in interest and attendance in Vancouver, two famous British professionals put on a display there in 1913 which still has old timers talking. Long Jim Barnes and Jack Hutchinson played an exhibition match over Shaughnessy at that time, after which Jack said he could reach the 500-yard first green in two shots with a putter. He collected several sizeable bets by actually overplaying the green in two. (It is probably sheer coincidence that the first hole later was lengthened to its present 565 yards.)

Shaughnessy is no stranger to Ben Hogan, present U. S. Open title holder and an expected entry in the 1948 Canadian Open. Hogan tested the course several times in 1942, and in that respect has the edge on his keener rival, South Africa's Bobby Locke. Locke, who will be defending his Canadian title in September, has played over Vancouver's Marine Drive course, but has yet to get acquainted with Shaughnessy.

Although the club has played host to the best in the game, the course record is still held by a Vancouver amateur, Kenny Black, former Canadian amateur champion. Black romped home in front of a star-studded field in the Gold Trail Open in 1936, shattering the course record with a nine-under-par 63 on the last round.

Fred Wood, who got his start as a caddy and improved until he ranked among the best of Canadian pros, is the professional at Shaughnessy. He and his counter-part at nearby Marine Drive, Stan Leonard, are expected to be high among Canadian entrants this year.
