Every so often one reads articles on conservation. Most of them are rather on the dry side and to most people not very interesting. Therefore I'm sure everyone who reads this column will enjoy reading the following article which has just about everything to make it strike home. It is quoted from Sylvia, the Lands and Forests Review, and was written by J. Macartney.

CONSERVATION

The practice of conservation — which is freely defined as the wise use of our resources — is one way of making the country a better place in which to live. Natural resources are fundamental to economic development and social progress, as represented by standards of living, and if carefully husbanded will constitute a perpetual annuity which will not only help to maintain these standards, but provide the means and inspiration for a zealous defense of them.

Wildlife is a renewable resource, capable of self-replenishment if given a reasonable chance, but it suffers from the fact that it is administered not only for its economic worth but also for its recreational value. In the latter respect, the public has a freedom of access and possession which might readily become destructive without proper safeguards. These safeguards are embodied in the general conservation programme and every phase of it has a direct bearing on the protection of our wildlife heritage. The recreational and moral values of fishing and hunting cannot be over-emphasized. The experiences of the outdoors are reflected in our national character and way of living.

In the environment of the outdoors, too, there is physical and mental rejuvenation; the opportunity to bolster morale and view life in its proper perspective. Wildlife is a dominant factor in this environment, therefore its conservation through law observance and the practice of sporting ethics, is of supreme importance. Let us surround it with all the security of trusteeship and it will pay big dividends in health and happiness.
