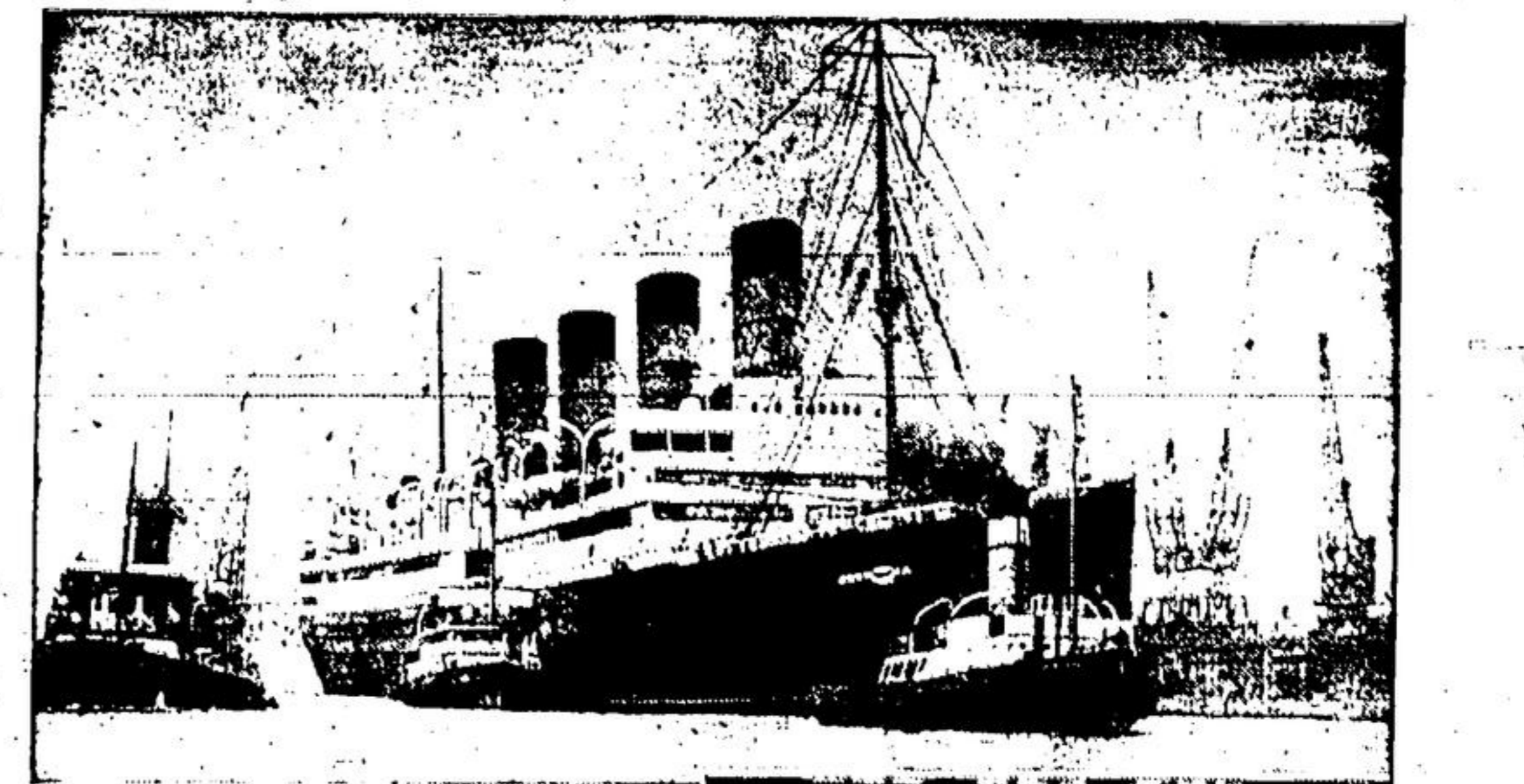

"AQUITANIA" INAUGURATES NEW SERVICE



The famous 46,000-ton liner "Aquitania" leaving Southampton for Halifax to inaugurate a new fast service between Britain and Canada under an agreement between Cunard White Star and the Canadian Government.

"Aquitania" carries more than 1,800 passengers, of whom 400 travel in First Class and the balance in Tourist Class. The ship will make a round trip voyage every three weeks, thereby increasing the transatlantic accommodation for business men and visitors as well as providing a greatly increased number of berths for settlers from the United Kingdom.
