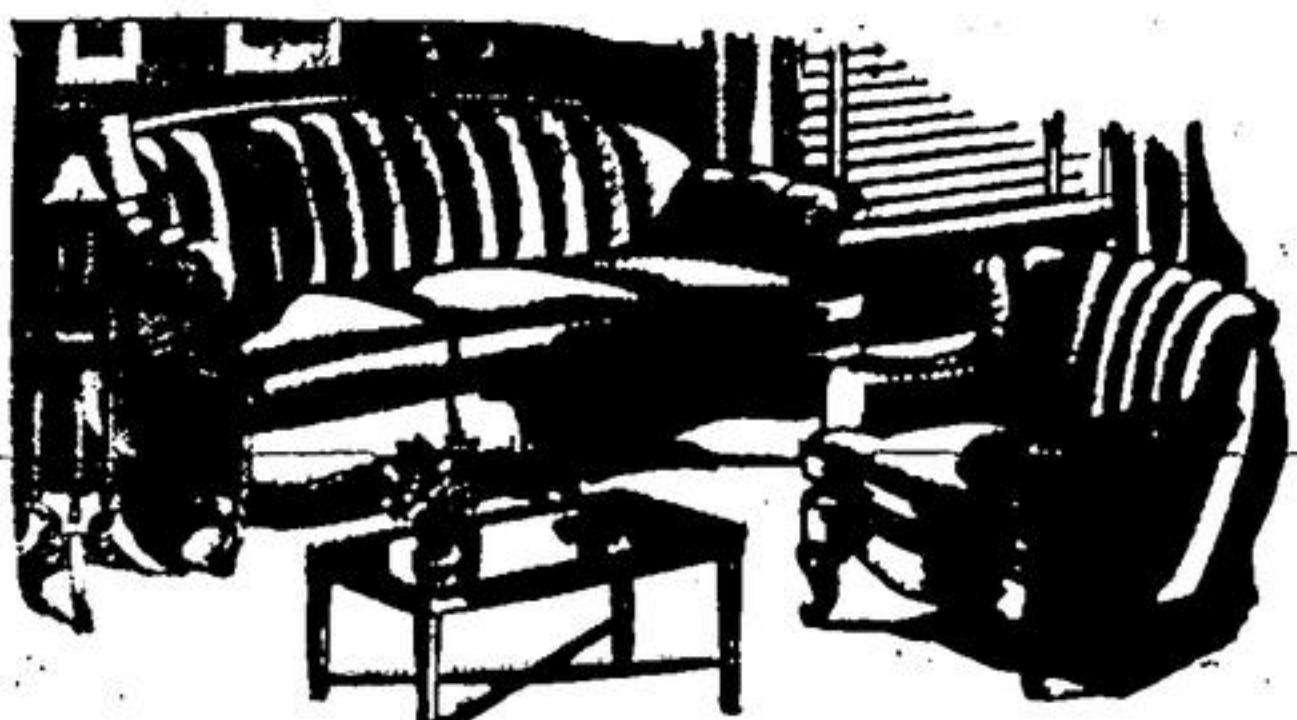

WAS MINISTER AT ASHGROVE & HORNBY

Minister of the Hornby Circuit of the United Church, with churches at Hornby, Ashgrove and Hornby in the early 1900s, Rev. John A. Neill died on Friday in Peel Memorial Hospital, Brampton, in his 78th year. Mr. Neill had been residing with his daughter in Stroudville for the past two years, and suffered a heart attack two weeks ago which ended in death.

Born at Clifford, he was a graduate of Northwestern University, Evanston, Illinois. Ordained in the Methodist Episcopal Church, he served a number of pastorates in the United States including Wisconsin, Nebraska, Wyoming and Iowa. He returned to Canada in 1907 and ministered to churches at Kemble, Colpo's Bay, Burford, Salford, Fenwick, Princeton and Keatside. Following his pastorate at Hornby, he went to Glen Allan and retired in 1938, later serving for several years as supply minister at Aberfoyle and Morrison.

Mr. Neill was a member of the Guelph Presbytery and former chairman of Halton Presbytery. In 1945 he celebrated with his wife their golden wedding anniversary.

He leaves his wife, Effie Haskins Neill, Streetsville; seven sons, Milard and Ralph of London; Leigh, Port Robinson; Merrill and John, Toronto; Addison, Clyde River, Baffin Island; and Gerald, Waterloo; two daughters, Mrs. Elsie McCurdy Streetsville and Mrs. Alma McKee, Elmira; and a sister, Mrs. Eleanor Hinds, Wisconsin.

The funeral service was held yesterday in Streetsville United Church with interment being made in Hill-side Cemetery, Ridgville.

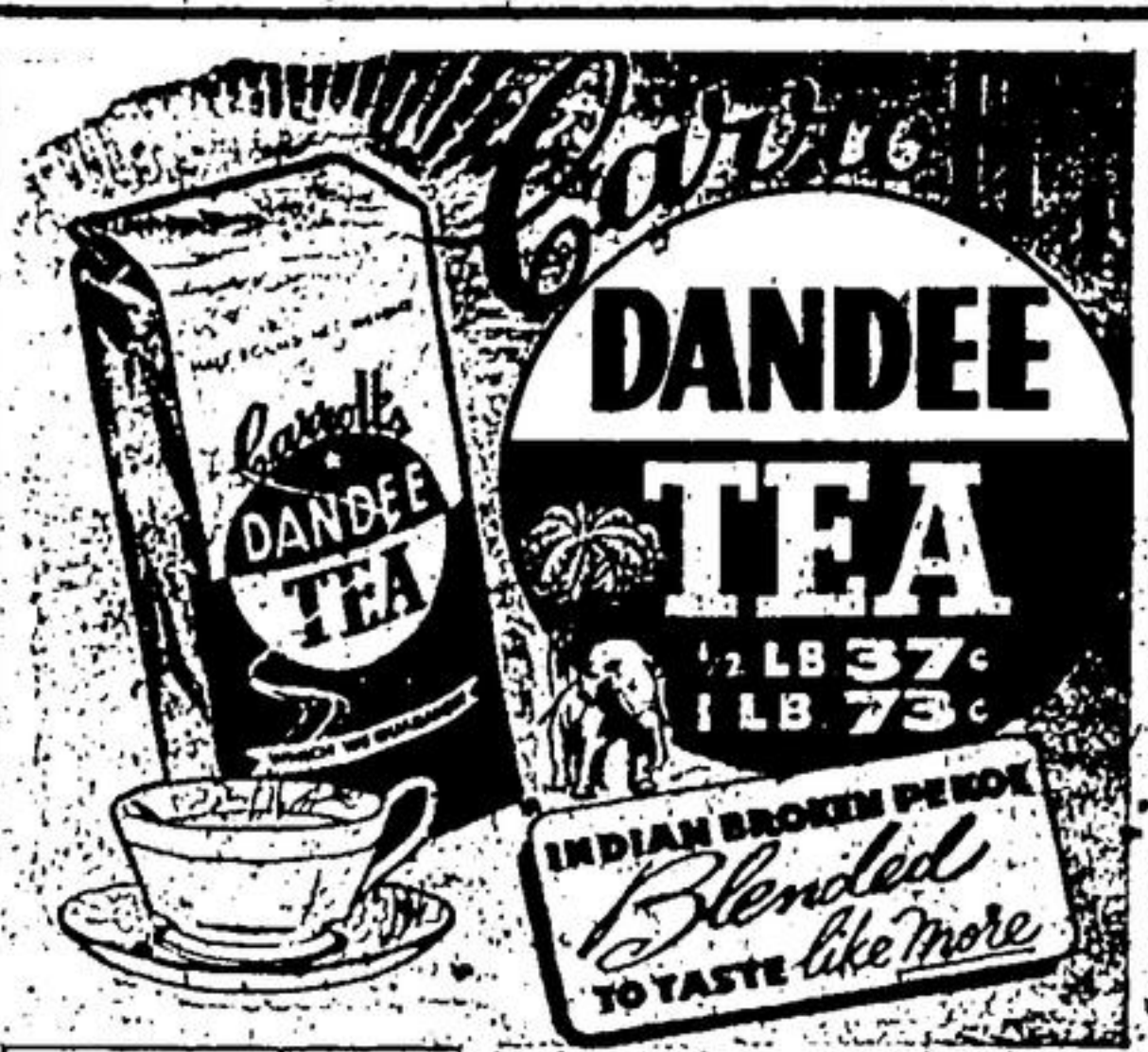
