Two weeks left to angle for Brown and Speckled Trout and Rainbows. September 15th at midnight is the closing date.

Lake Trout
No closed season in Great Lakes, Georgian Bay, North Channel, Bay of Quinte and River St. Lawrence. Inland Waters, south of and excluding the French and Mattawa Rivers and Lake Nipissing from November 6th to October 5th next following.

Black Bass
July 1st to October 15th except River St. Clair, Lake St. Clair, Detroit River, Lake Erie and Niagara River from Lake Erie to Niagara Falls, June 25th to December 15th, Muskoka.

Pike
July 1st to Oct. 1st except River St. Clair, Lake St. Clair, Detroit River, Lake Erie and Niagara River from Lake Erie to Niagara Falls, June 25th to December 15th.

Yellow Pickerel and Pike
No closed season in Great Lakes, Georgian Bay, North Channel and their intervening international connecting waters and River St. Lawrence, excepting that the Bay of Quinte is closed for Pickerel from April 21st to May 14th.

Inland Waters: South of and including the French and Mattawa Rivers and Lake Nipissing; Pickerel from May 15th to Dec. 31st; Pike, May 15th to March 31st.

North and West of and excluding the French and Mattawa Rivers and Lake Nipissing: Pickerel: from May 15th to April 14th next following; Pike — no closed season if taken by angling. (Note) All dates herein mentioned are inclusive.

At Peterborough Exhibition last week, August 25th to 28th, the McMillan horses, with Ken, Glad and Joyce, staged a field day, winning seven firsts and three seconds. In the pair class they were first, as they were in the tandem. In the Over 15.2, Mrs. McMillan was first with Davy and in the Under 15.2 Halton Performer won the class.

In the Harness Horse Stake, Halton was first and Davy, second. In the Ladies' Harness class, the largest ever staged at Peterborough, Joyce was first, driving Halton Performer. In the 3-gaited Saddle Division, Joyce with Sky Rocket, won the combination class and placed second in the Over 15.2. She was also second in the Open Saddle Stake.

The Editor's Corner
IT'S OUR MOVE

The decision of North Halton High School Area Board to transport students from the Norval area to Milton High School next term is a serious matter for Georgetown High School. It will remove twenty to thirty students from the local school and means a much smaller enrolment here than there has been for many years. This in turn will mean that local education costs will be higher as government grants are dependent on the number of students attending a school.

It is too bad that matters have become so confused and that Georgetown, in her fight to retain local schools rather than have one district school has ended up 'behind the eight ball' while Milton and Acton, whose council and school board members were willing to close their local schools, now will possess larger schools and a larger enrolment drawn from the Georgetown district. There is little solace at present in knowing that those in Georgetown who refused to close the school here have been proven right and that all plans for a central school at Speyside for the three towns have been abandoned for all time. The only course we see open now is for Georgetown to eat a little humble pie and approach North Halton Area Board with a request to be included in a three-school area.

Attending the Board meeting last Thursday, we were impressed by the fairness of the board and of its chairman, Dr. Carl Martin of Milton. Dr. Martin went out of his way to give both sides of the picture to the several Norval parents who were at the meeting to find out where their children were to attend school this term. Had the Norval group argued strongly for their children to come to Georgetown we have no doubt that the board would have made every effort to see that their wishes were granted. However, they correctly interpreted the majority feeling, which was that Norval preferred her students to come to Georgetown, but would not be against having them taken by bus to Milton, and decided that Milton it would be.

According to the North Halton Board, they approached Georgetown High School Board this spring to ask if Georgetown would join in a three school system. A reply was asked for in ten days time in order that plans for school additions could be made. When no reply was received, and when it was learned that the local school board had not discussed it with Georgetown Council, the Area Board proceeded to arrange the necessary building additions in Milton and Acton and laid plans to transport students from all parts of Esquesing where it was economically feasible so to do.

There is no doubt that our local board acted in good faith at the time. There was no guarantee that the three-school system would be the final form of North Halton High School Area and the feeling might have been that they might be trapped into the central school system which finds little favour here. There is still this possibility, but this seems so remote that we believe Georgetown is justified in seeking immediate admission to the area. There are certain legal technicalities involved which bars our admission for two years, but these are not insurmountable. If we judge North Halton Area Board correctly, such a request would have a courteous hearing and a successful outcome.

POT POURRI

"Hot, isn't it?" was the main salutation in Georgetown last week as it was all over Canada. The break in the heat wave on Sunday was most welcome. Enough is enough. Have you listened to the "Candid Microphone" radio program on Friday nights? One of the most novel ideas yet for a radio show and we heartily recommend it.
