Huttonville Manufacturer Dies in Toronto
 A well-known district businessman and member of an old Huttonville family, Angus McMurphy died yesterday in Toronto General Hospital in his 61st year. Son of the late Archie McMurphy and Esther Ostrander, he joined the McMurphy and Company woollen mills when a young man, and in partnership with his brother, A. C. McMurphy, had been head of the business since 1926. The firm had been established by his father and uncle in 1887. He is survived by his wife, Ethel Troyer, two brothers, A. C. and Gordon, and two sisters, Mary of St. Catharines and Mrs. Wilson Fraser of Huttonville. The funeral service is being held from the funeral home of the Brampton Funeral Services on Thursday at 3:30 with interment following in Brampton Cemetery.

MAIN STREET BUSINESS CHANGES HANDS
 Another business change on Main Street is noted this week with the announcement that Mr. and Mrs. Frank Penson have sold their fish and chip business to David Bowman and Harry McMurtry. The new proprietors, who will conduct the business under the name of Empire Lunch will open it for business tomorrow. The Pensons have conducted the business for the past five years, buying it from Mrs. Penson's sister, Mrs. John Cordaro. Originally located across the street in the Cordaro building, they purchased the present building beside the Municipal Office a few years ago and moved across. The new proprietors are both well-known here, Mr. Bowman having been employed for sixteen years with Harley-Kay-Maxland and Mr. McMurtry coming here a year ago as a member of the local Provincial Police detachment. Mr. and Mrs. Bowman and family have moved into the apartment upstairs. Both men are war veterans with overseas service and Mr. Bowman is at present president of Branch 120, Canadian Legion.
