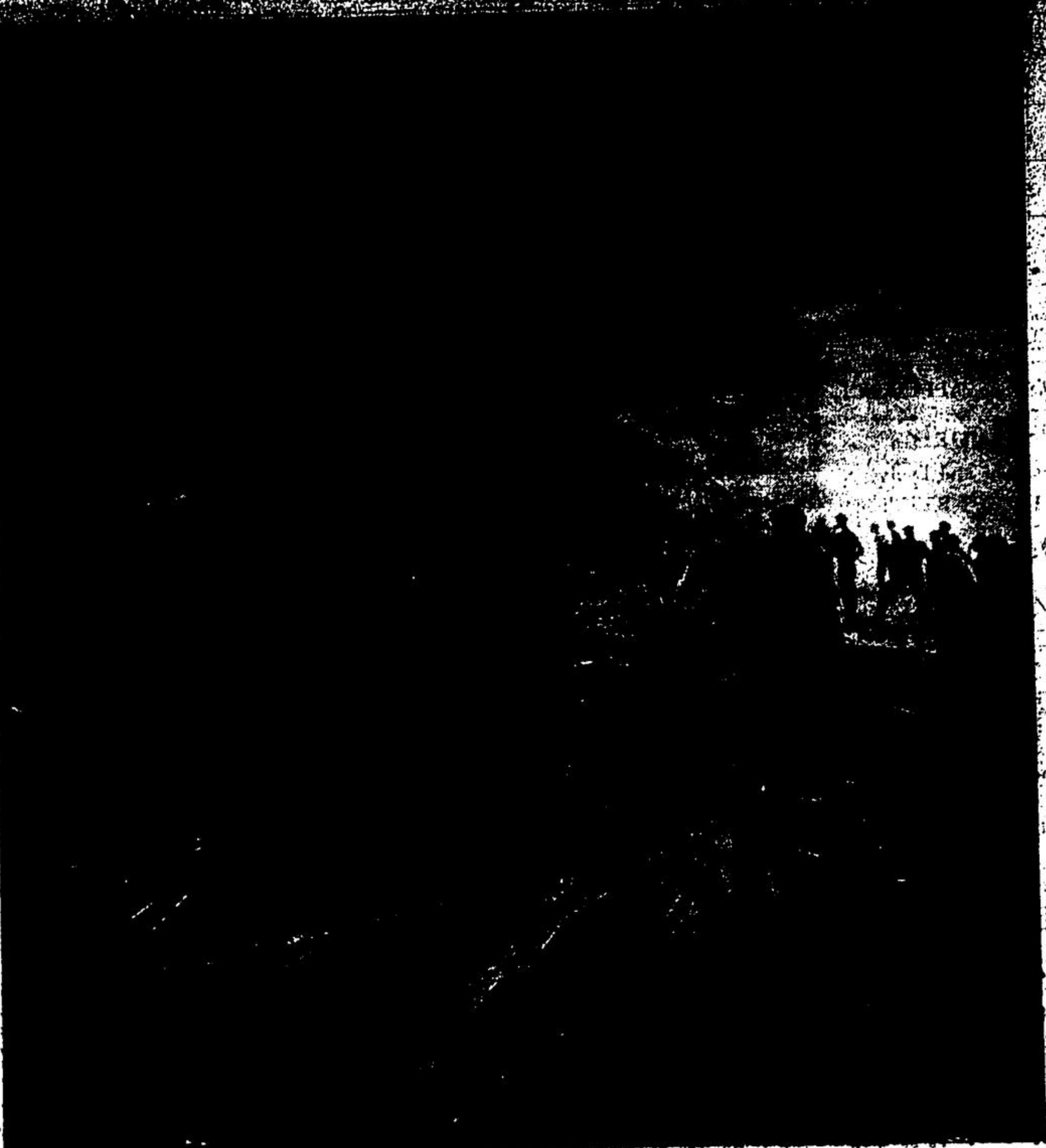


Freight Trains Crash Near Georgetown

Deer and Pheasant Hunt Planned in Nassagaweya

At the monthly meeting of Nassagaweya Township Council last week, it was decided to hold a deer hunt in the township this year. Licences for the deer hunt, which will be supervised by the Department of Lands and Forests will be limited to ratepayers to the number of 100, and the township has suggested to the Department that Nassagaweya receive some financial returns from licences sold. An additional 50c was added to the cost of the pheasant licence, to be turned over to the Halton County Sportsman's Association. Representatives from this organization and the Department of Lands and Forests attended the meeting.

The Council petitioned the County Council to ask the Department of Highways to have No. 7 Highway white-marked from Acton to Georgetown and beyond. The usual request of Acton Branch, Canadian Legion, for a wreath and programs for Remembrance Day was granted. The Reeve and Clerk were authorized to petition the Minister of Public Works and Highways for the interim payment of the statutory grant on road expenditure to August 31st, 1948. The amount of \$28.00 taxes and 36c interst was ordered struck off the 1947 tax account as uncollectable. Accounts amounting to \$225 and the road superintendent's vouchers of \$2146.46 were ordered paid.
