What Esquering Council Did

ON TUESDAY, SEPT 7th

Approved a year limit in the township, on condition that 50 per cent of the license be paid to residents and 50 per cent of license fees be retained by the township. The total number of licenses will not exceed 100.

Passed a by-law reappointing the road superintendent on a different salary basis.

Assented by by-law the several school sections, union school sections, Township School Area No. 1, and Chingachewy West school area. Paid accounts including: Bell, \$9.50; Haves and Nelson, garage and hall account, \$857.27; Road accounts, \$2274.82.

Paid sheep claims of \$40 made up as follows: Ray McNeary, lamb killed, \$18. F. W. Sheath, valuator, \$4. Malcolm Stark, sheep killed, \$14. A. N. Stark, valuator \$4.

Adjourned to meet on September 10th, when further business was dealt with, including the appointment of L. M. Bennett as tax collector; the Dept. of Highways was petitioned for the statutory grant on road expenditures to date of \$39,119.10; \$6000 for garage construction was transferred from Capital Account to Road Account.

Dr. Glen preached the sermon at both Norval and Union Churches.

Memorial Area, Cenotaph Dedication Planned

Dedication of Georgetown Memorial Area and the plaques on the Cenotaph containing the names of those who fell in the Second World War is planned for Sunday afternoon, September 26th. It will take the form of a religious service in which local ministers, the Canadian Legion, Lorne Scots Band and Georgetown Girls Pipe Band will take part, and the main part of the service will probably be held at the Cenotaph. Plans are being made by Cr. Norman Hill, chairman of Veterans' Affairs on the town council and officials of the local Legion branch. It is planned to make it a Legion zone rally and invite legion members from all towns in this zone. Full details will appear in next week's edition of the Herald.
