 year that better fire escapes be provided. Cr. Goodlet suggested that the Fire Committee chairman have the Fire Chief check to see that exits were adequate.

Will share half cost with the Hydro for a survey of trees to be trimmed in town with an estimate of cost of trimming. The survey will cost \$25.

Were informed by Dale and Bennett, acting for W. J. McDonald, Maple Avenue, that sewerage excavations had been made and trees removed on his property without notice or consent after he had been told that sewerage would not cross his property and that a damage statement would follow. The matter was turned over to Town Solicitor K. M. Langdon.

Turned over to the Property Committee a request from Mrs. M. Webster, Guelph Street, to remove three or four trees from in front of her property which were causing roof damage.

Will contact Scott, Jackson Construction Company and ask that all fill left over from sewerage installation be used on town property. Council had learned that this was being used on private property.

Opened tenders from B. F. Murfin Sheet Metal Works and Georgetown Plumbing and Heating for installing a furnace in the Old Town Hall. Discussion on the matter was deferred till next Monday's meeting.

Discussed the high school situation, after the clerk had read a letter sent by the School Board to the Mayor, and the Mayor's reply. 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Council of ten years ago for helping to defeat the by-law for an addition to the school. The Board, at that time, said the letter, was met with "shocking discourtesy." The Mayor in his reply stated that he thought the school board should be open to criticism the same as the town council, that courtesy was and has always been extended to any delegation to Council and that at present he is more concerned with retaining a high school in Georgetown than in being mayor. He has supported the appointment and re-appointment of all present board members, but he felt that he was justified in criticizing what he thought had been lack of activity on the board's part.

Reeve MacLaren reported that the Mayor and he had lately seen Dr. Carl Martin of Milton, chairman of the area board and that they had gained the impression that the board was almost unanimous against a central school and favored a three-school set-up which would include Georgetown. The Mayor said Esquating was not too happy and one family had already withdrawn their children from Milton and were sending them back to school here. Cr. Herbert said that he was happy to see the Speyside school idea being dropped and that it justified Georgetown's original stand.
