

Council, of ten years ago for helping to defeat the by-law for an addition to the school. The Board, at that time, said the letter, was met with "shocking discourtesy." The Mayor in his reply stated that he thought the school board should be open to criticism the same as the town council, that courtesy, was and and has always been exended to any delegation to Council and that at present he is more concerned with retaining a high school in Georgetown than in being mayor. He has supported the appointment and reappointment of all present board members, but he felt that he was justified in criticizing what he thought had been lack of activity on the board's part.
