Norval Eliminated in Pee-Wee Lacrosse Tourney

After winning their first game from Owen Sound, 12-7, in the OLA Pee-Wee Tournament at Mimico on Saturday, Norval was eliminated from further competition when they lost 8-4 to Port Dalhousie in the second game.

Eleven teams were entered in the tournament which was played at three centres, Mimico, New Toronto and Long Branch. At Mimico Port Dalhousie eliminated St. John's, Toronto, 12-2, before playing Norval. Scores at New Toronto were St. Catharines, 11—St. Vincent's, 5; Peterborough, 15—Fergus, 4; St. Catharines, 9—Peterborough, 8.

At Long Branch, Roden defeated Brampton 8-4 and scored a decisive win over Orillia 12-2. Port Dalhousie and St. Catharines will now meet in a home-and-home series, with the winner meeting Roden in a final game which is slated to be played before the east-west Senior Lacrosse play-offs. Port Dalhousie, who have already beaten St. Kits five times this season are heavy favourites to go through to the championship.
