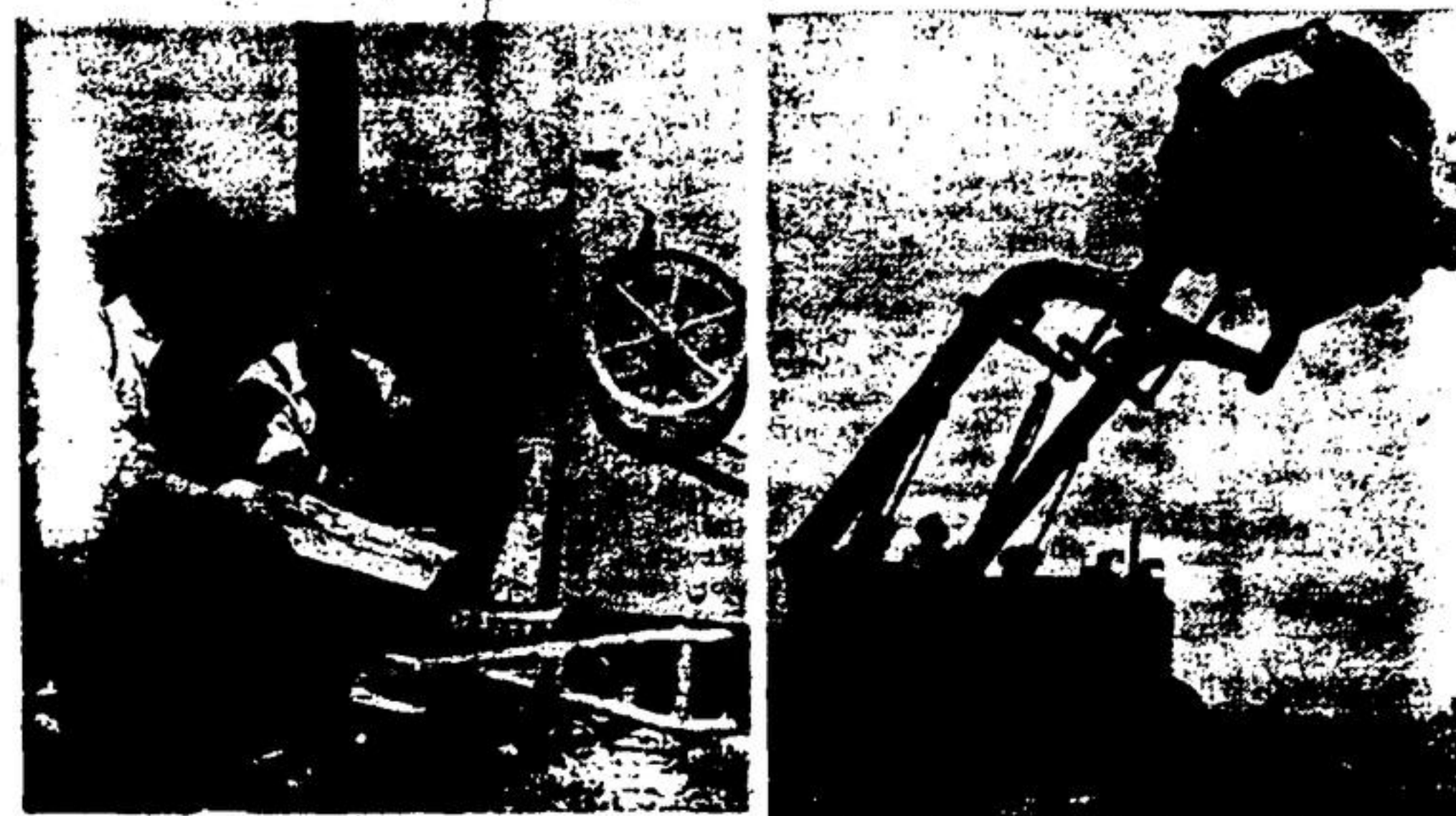
Donald Dawson, brother of the bride, was best man and the ushers were the groom's brothers, Ted and Bob Howard.

Last Friday, the first in a series of monthly child health clinics was held in the Legion Hall. The clinics are planned for the second Friday in each month and are for infants and pre-school children. They are under the direction of the Halton Health Unit. Seventeen children attended on Friday for examination and toxoid injections. Dr. J. Mather, county medical officer of health supervised the free clinic, assisted by Miss Ellen Weedmark, Georgetown and district nurse, Miss Audrey Anderson of Milton and Mrs. Norman Verdec, a volunteer from the I.O.D.E.

Next month's clinic will be held on Wednesday, November 17th, after which the clinics will revert to the regular Friday schedule.
