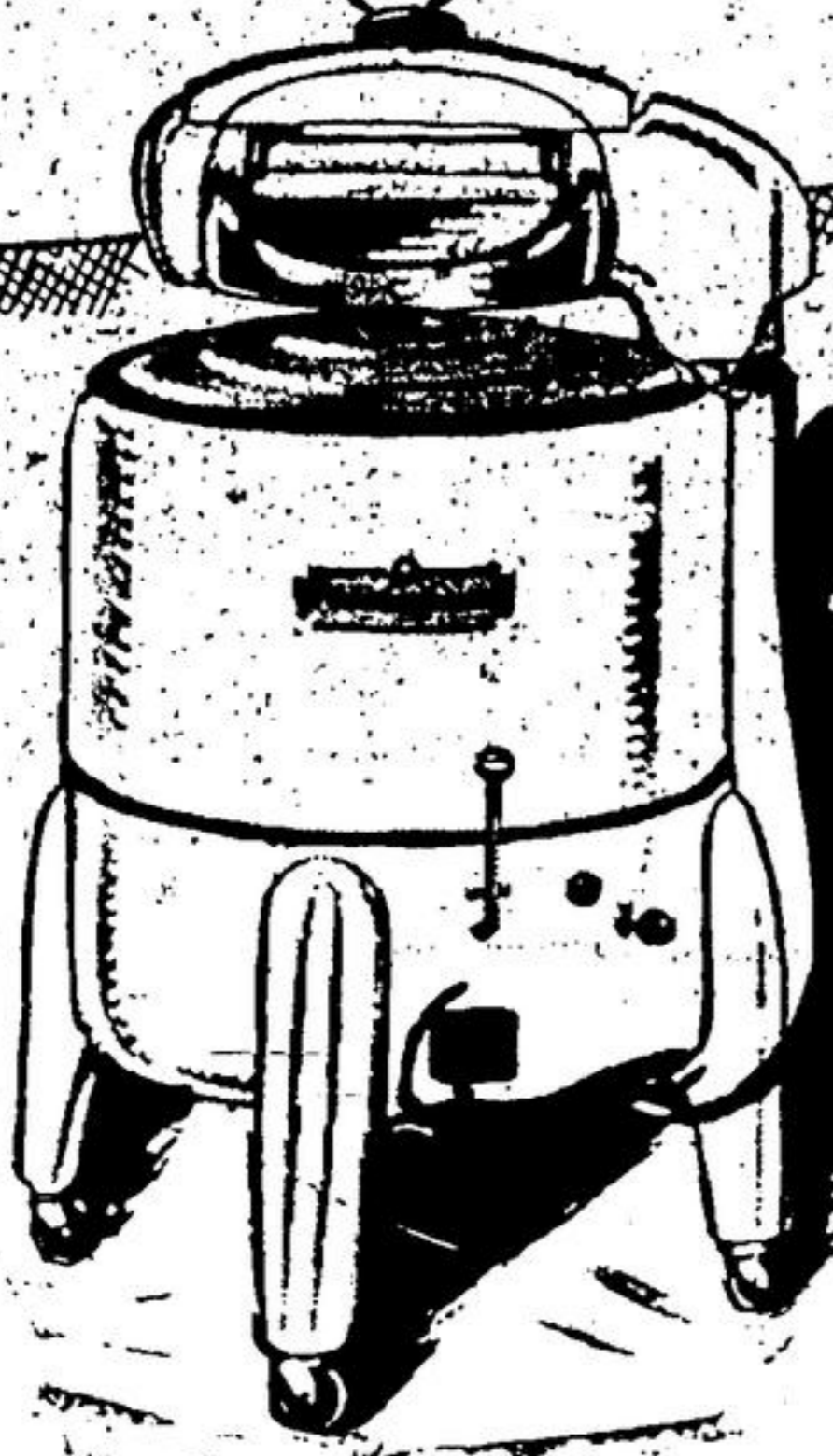

**Church History Reviewed  
at Hornby Anniversary**

On Sunday, October 10th, the Hornby United Church observed its 125th anniversary. In the morning Rev. Wesley Hunnisett, of the Fred Victor Mission in Toronto, and his boys provided an interesting program of music, with an address on the United Church and its work. In the evening Rev. James Blair, of St. Paul's United Church in Milton spoke on the Task of the Church. Mrs. James McDougall, and Mrs. Murray Hayward sang solos. A brief history of the Hornby Community and its churches was read by the minister, Rev. Fred Ainsworth, very much as follows.

In the year 1818 five men with their families left the old land, arriving in June of the same year. They were John Dempsey, John Fisher, Abraham Nelson, Thomas Joyce, and John Wilson. Dempsey and Fisher came from Scotland, Nelson, Joyce, and Wilson from Ireland. They came by stage-coach along Dundas Street as far as Mun's Corner, then by foot up the sixth line, which at that time was only a blazed trail through dense forest. At the corner of the base line between Trafalgar and Esquesing townships, and the sixth line were two large elm trees, and under these trees the five men spent their first night. This was in the month of July, 1818.

During that fall they chose five homesteads, and built five log cabins, shaping the logs with common axes, while with a whip-saw they fipped the boards for flooring, and clapboards for the roofs. Then they returned to York for the winter, coming back in the spring with their families and belongings. The families walked, while the oxen brought their possessions.

In the year 1822 Jasper Martin took up lot No. 14, concession 2, where the town of Milton now stands. The following year, 1823, he built a grist mill, which became a great convenience to the settlers, who came through the woods carrying grain on their backs, to be made into flour for their families.

As far as church building was concerned, the Methodists were the first in the field, and in the year 1823 they erected a log church of the west corner of the eighth line at the base line, in the township of Esquesing. In 1825 another church

**GEORGETOWN UNITED CHURCH**

The service of Thanksgiving held in the Georgetown United Church on Sunday, October 3rd was well attended. Fruits, vegetables, autumn leaves and flowers placed by members of the 50-50 club decorated the church in seasonal fashion. The lesson was read from Phillipians 4:4-13 and Psalm 100. Rev. John M. Smith based his Thanksgiving message on the words "Serve the Lord with gladness" enter into His courts with Thanksgiving. When we consider the communal and personal benefits which we enjoy as Canadians, he said, there is much for which we can be thankful. Our gratitude to God, he said, ought to be shown in actual service for the Kingdom as well as in the singing of hymns. The choir under the direction of Miss Lynda Stewart sang the anthem "O Give Thanks Unto the Lord." As a symbol of gratitude an offering was received for the purpose of sending clothing to Europe.

A service of Infant Baptism was held on Sunday afternoon when Brian Roy William Preston, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Preston was baptized.

The evening service was opened with the singing of several well-known hymns. The message was based on the text Judges 5:16 and was entitled "The Convenient Sheepfold."

was built at Bloomfield on the sixth line, in Trafalgar Township. Still another was erected on lot 2, concession 7, which is now Clifford Wrigglesworth's farm, in Esquesing. This appears to have been a Baptist Church, and was later burnt. It was used by the Hornby Literary and Debating Society for a while.

About the year 1838 the Presbyterians built a frame church, and also started a cemetery on the north-east corner of the eighth line and the base line, directly opposite the Methodist Church. This was replaced in the year 1876 by the present brick building. Regular services have not been held in this newer church for several years. At present it has been the custom to hold one worship service each year. Funeral services are also occasionally held in it, and it is kept in a very good state of repair.

In the year 1840 the Anglicans built a frame church on the south side of the base line at the ninth concession, where they have worshipped ever since. A cemetery was also started.

Going back again we find that the first schoolhouse was built in Hornby in the year 1826. It was a log building, and stood beside the Orange Hall. Over 100 pupils are said to have been on the roll when one Charles McLennan was teacher there. The brick building now in use dates back to 1870. To this new school more pupils came, and at one time there were 130 of them on the school roll. Two teachers were employed, Lyons, Leighton, Bachelor, and Brookbank were among the oldtime teachers, the present teacher being Miss Nellie Jardine.

Orangemen have always formed a large percentage of the citizens of Hornby, and the first Orange Hall was built in the year 1823, on the farm owned by A. Stark. This was a log building with a clapboard roof. In the year 1858 the hall which now stands was built.

The present building used as the United Church was the first brick church built in Hornby, but since the records are not now available, we do not have information as to the date of its erection. Unions in 1880 and 1881 brought various Methodist Church bodies together, and then in the year 1925 the United Church of Canada was established. Looking back, then, to the year 1823 when the first Methodist Church was built here in Hornby we find that we have been 125 years on the go as a Methodist and United Church, and look forward hopefully to many more years of service. Some of the more recent ministers of the church were Rev. John A. Neill, Ph.D., Rev. Benjamin Eyre, B.A., B.D., Rev. J. O. Totton and at present Rev. Fred Ainsworth, M.A., B.D. The seven hotels that some of the old time ministers battled have all gone, as has also the brewery, though part of one remains in the residence occupied for many years by Jim Bailey and more recently by Mrs. Barker and her family of boys.
