**George Reid was Early Georgetown Resident**

The eldest of a pioneer family George D. Reid passed away in Christie Street Hospital, Toronto, on Saturday evening, October 9th, at the age of 85. He was one of seven children of the late Dugald Reid and Janet McGill and was born in Georgetown. In his youth he was associated with his father and brother in operating the hardware store which passed out of the family ownership a few years ago when John P. Reid retired and sold the business to James Goodlet. Always interested in athletics, Mr. Reid was a keen lacrosse player and played on Georgetown championship teams before the turn of the century.  
He went west at the time of the Klondyke gold rush and lived in the west until 1929 when he returned to Georgetown and later went to Toronto to make his home. A war veteran, he served overseas in the first Great War. Mr. Reid was an avid reader and took a great interest in the town of his birth and has compiled many interesting facts about early days in Georgetown.  
Unmarried, he is survived by a brother, John P. Reid of Georgetown and a sister, Mrs. H. G. Wood (Katherine) of Rochester, Minnesota. The funeral service on Tuesday morning from the Ross Craig Funeral Home was followed by cremation at St. James Crematorium.
