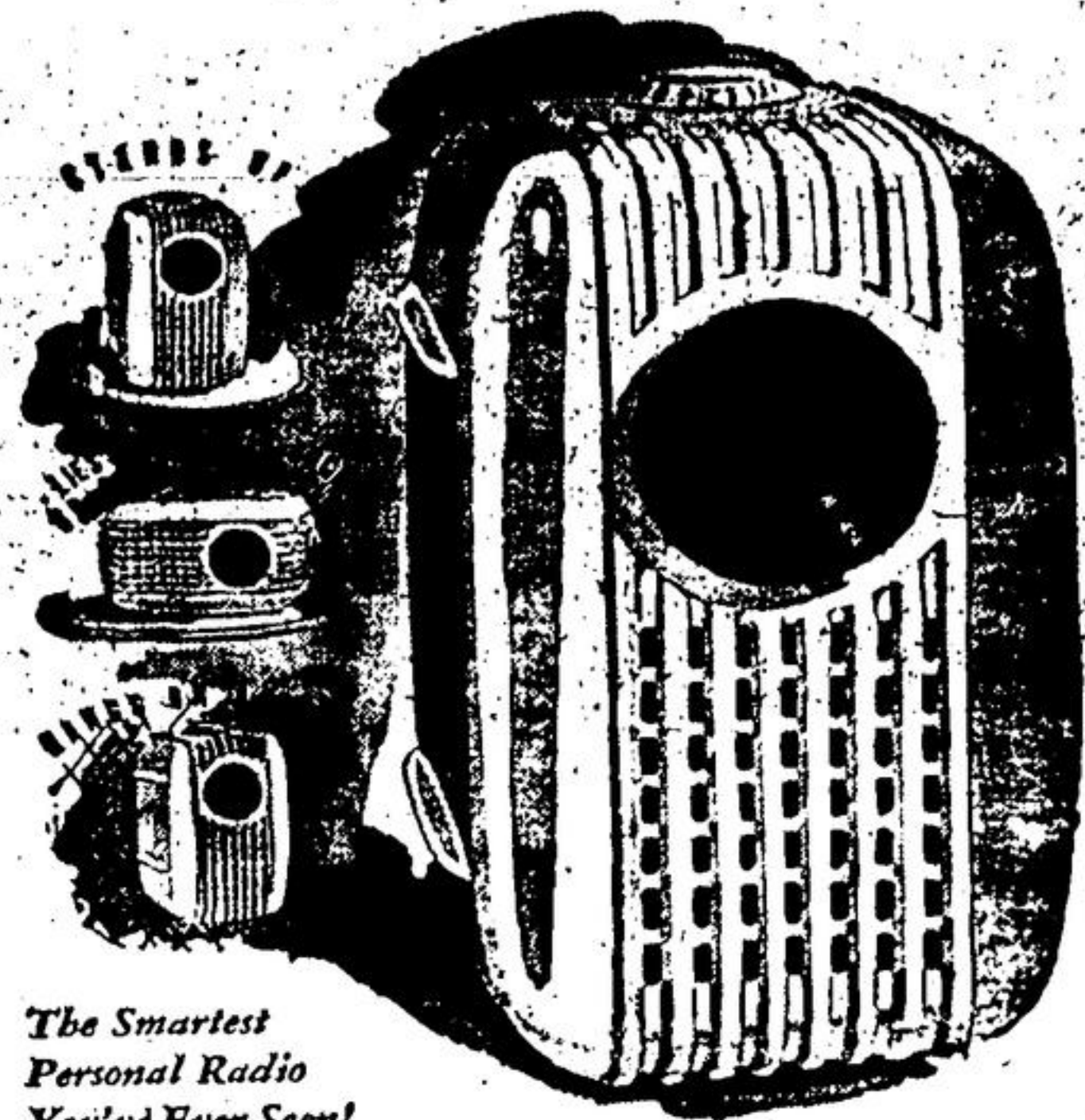

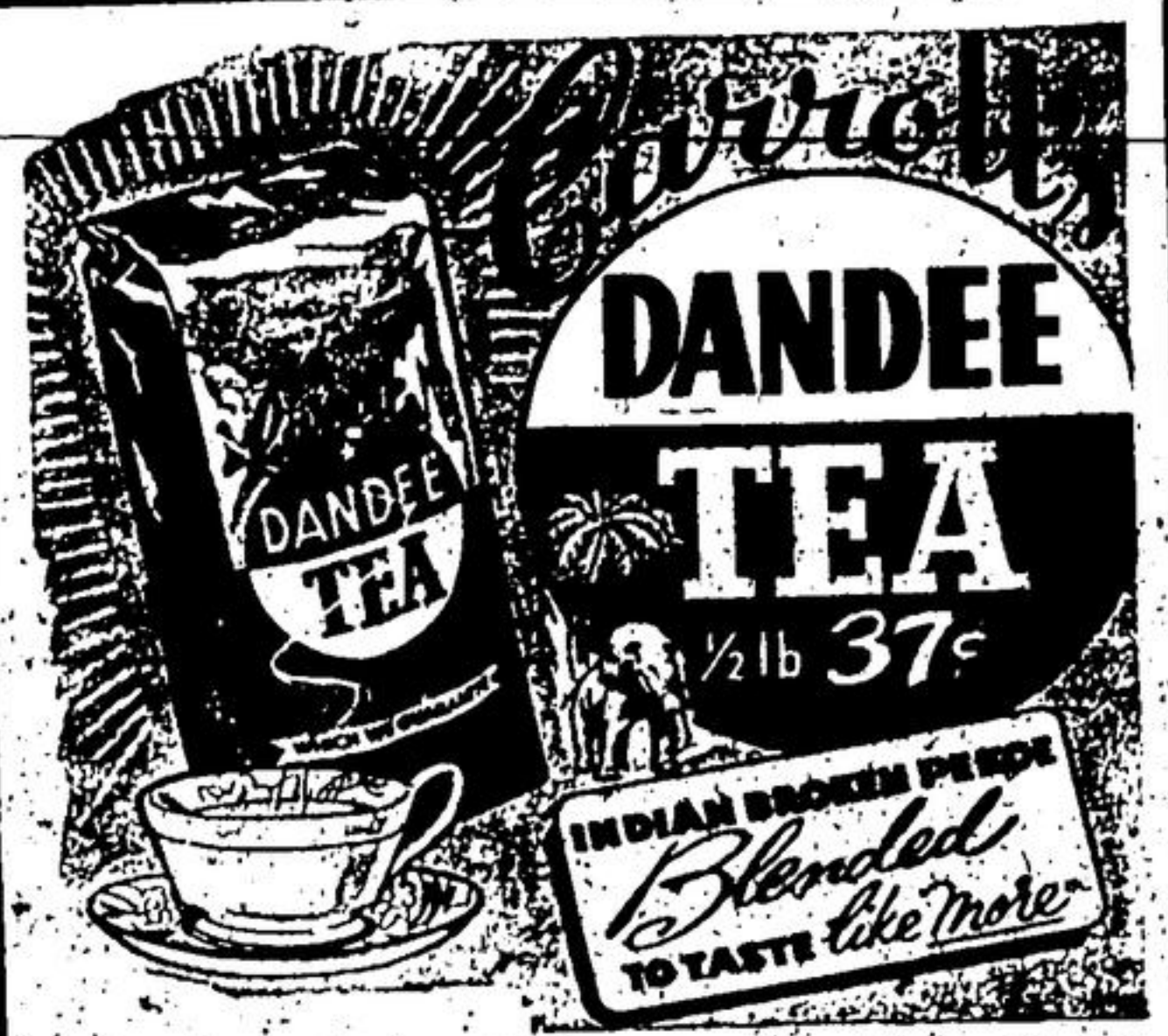
SCHOOL NURSE SPEAKS TO BUSY BEES W.I.
