**NEWS AND ITEMS OF INTEREST TO HALTON FARMERS**

**JUNIOR CLUB MEMBERS HAVE BUSY DAY AT THE O.A.C.**

Friday of last week marked the annual provincial inter-club competitions for Ontario's Club members. Upwards of 200 Club teams, each made up of two Club members between the ages of 16 and 20 inclusive, and who had not previously represented their Club in a former inter-club competition. In the same project, were in action at the O.A.C. In all there were eight different competitions under way during the day. These young people represented some 10,405 young people enrolled in Ontario in 1948 in such projects as beef calf clubs, dairy calf clubs, swine clubs, poultry clubs, grain clubs, potato clubs, and in the home economic field—food and clothing clubs.

Halton County was represented by five Club teams in all and while they brought home no major honours, all made an excellent showing, particularly so in view of the very limited amount of special training received preparatory to these competitions.

In the dairy cattle competition, 51 Club teams judged four classes of dairy cattle and gave oral reasons for their placings on each. They also answered orally ten questions pertaining to feeding and management of dairy cattle, marketing, dairy cattle diseases, etc. In short, it was a long hard day for the competitors and judges alike, and this competition which started at 9.00 a.m., did not conclude until well after 6.00 p.m. The Championship in this project which was won by a Halton team last year went to a Peel County team composed of Clark Lyons of Norval, and Ralph Duntun of Brampton, with a score of 1089 out of a possible 1200. Stuart Alexander of Georgetown and Geo. Burkholder of Freeman, representing the Milton Holstein and Ayrshire Calf Club, were in fifth position, with a score of 1068. The high man was Clark Lyons, with a score of 559, with Stuart Alexander, Halton's high competitor, with 551.

The Beef competition, with 25 teams in action, was won by a South Simcoe Club team with a score of 1022, while Garnet Norrish and Alex Buchanan representing the Halton Calf Club were in ninth place with 975. The Acton Calf Club team, composed of Ray Everdell and Bill Patterson, scored 878.

Thirty eight Club teams faced the wire in the Grain Club project. The Championship here went to a York County team with a score of 1103. Sam Harrop and John Currie, both of Esqueping Township, representing the Milton Grain Club were in sixth position and the Acton Grain Club team of Ron Helmsley and Clarence Reid were eleventh.

The Swine Club trophy which was won by a Halton team in 1946 this year went to Elgin County while a Leeds team won the poultry project honours and Welland County the honours in the Potato project.

In home economics a pair of Perth County young ladies topped the Food project and Middlesex the Clothing Project. The winning teams will now represent Ontario in the inter-provincial competitions to be held at the Royal Winter Fair next month. Rural Ontario will wish them well in this friendly battle of provincial champions.
