#### WHAT'S YOUR BEEF?

We have had no takers as yet to inaugurate our 'What's Your Beef"? column, so this week the editor will start the ball rolling with a beef he picked up from daily newspaper reports of last week. It was an item that the Income Tax Department has decided to allow. Protestant ministers to live in rent-free houses and charge no tax on the value of living accommodation provided. A joint statement issued by Finance Minister Abbott and Revenue Minister McCann expressed the opinion that it was doubtful if this could be doneunder the income tax law as it stands, but the exemption would apply pending an amendment to the act at the next session of parliament when it is understood clergymen will be given a statutory right of some kind. The reasons given for the exemption are that Catholic priests subsist on their parish collections and because their income is derived from fees they are not required to pay tax on the rental value of free living accommodation and secondly that the parsonage is used to some extent for the general benefit of the congregation as meetings and gatherings are held there.

What's our beef? Just this - that two wrongs don't make a right and that the government, instead of providing a system whereby the clergy of other denominations will make their fair contributions to the tax exchequer have broadened the interpretation of the act to exempt a further large group from certain taxes. It will hardly meet with approval from the army of taxpayers who weekly and at the end of each year contribute a large slice of their earnings to tax payments.

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
